MARTHA MC PHERSON, B 1797. D.8/4/1884 who married JAMES GREGORIE

JAMES MC PHERSON (A1) came to America from BA-DE-NOCH, Invernesshire, Scotland, the seat of the chief of the Clan " McPherson". The chief of the clan was known as "CLUNY", which name has been since used in the family as a Christian name. Tradition says that JAMES (A 1) was a brother of the then "Cluny". Tradition also says that 3 brothers came to America. One settling in Penn. one in N.J. and one in S.C., about 1650.

MAJOR JAMES MC PHERSON (B 1) distinguished himself in the war against the southern Indians and was rewarded by a large tract of land, given by the crown, situated in the lower part of S.C. near the coast, including Prince Williams Parish. He left a large forrune. It is said that during the Indian War his wife Rachel assisted by loading muskets for the men. During pauses, she ran her hanfs thru her hair in the excitement, pushing it from her forehead. ~~Shortly~~ Shortly after, a son was born, whose hair stood on end. The McPhersons were strong adherents of the Stuarts and with n them suffered many privations

ISAAC MCPHERSON (C 2) was a captain of militia in the cavalry in the Revolution. His sword was lost or stolen during the Confederate war.

JAMES ELLIOTT MCPHERSON (D) left his plantation " Brewton" to his son O'Brien for life. Then to revert to James & John. It was later owned by Dr.I.McP.Gregorie, then passed to John Gregorie.
