Declaration

In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

State of Georgia
County of Pike

On this the 25th day of June, eighteen hundred and thirty three, Personally appeared before me a Justice of the Peace in and for the County of Pike + State of Georgia, James Leak a resident of said County of Pike + State of Georgia, aged ~~sixty~~ ^{sixty eight} years, who being first duly sworn, according to Law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress, passed June 7th 1832. - That he entered the service of the United States, under the following named officers, and served as therein stated: That he entered the service as a substitute for a man by the name of Grisham (his christian name not recollectd) in Captain Adams Company of drafted militia, in Caswell County North Carolina, about the first of July, seventeen hundred and eighty, marched from Caswell County, North Carolina, under Captain Adams and Lieutenant Parks to a place in North Carolina, then called Crofs creek (now Fayetteville) was stationed at Crofs Creek a few days from which place marched under

General Butler, in South Carolina, and joined
General Horatia Gates, at Rugeley's mills
near Camden, who was then the Commander
in chief, of all of us. This applicant was in
the engagement under General Gates, on the
fifteenth August of that year near Camden
against Lord Cornwallis. This was a three
months tour of duty, and after Gates's defeat
we marched under Captain Adom (John or George,
was his name to the best of his recollection) to a place
called New Providence in North Carolina,
where we were stationed: after we reached new
Providence, our Regiment was commanded
by Colonel William Moore. Our term of
service expired at this place, and at which
this applicant received a written discharge from
Captain Adom, which he has lost long since.
This applicant at the time he entered the service
lived in Caswell County, North Carolina,
and his discharge was dated about the first of
October, Seventeen Hundred and Eighty. And
this applicant further states that he has
no documentary evidence wherewith to substantiate
his claim, and that he knows of no person
whose testimony it is in his power to procure.

The next tour of duty this applicant performed was as a drafted Militia ^{man} in the month of June seventeen hundred and eighty one, was drafted in Caswell County, North Carolina under Captain Berry Turner and Lieutenant Dudley Gatewood, this was about the middle of June to the best of his recollection of the year last of our aid; from Caswell County marched under Captain Berry Turner, to Hillsborough, where we were commanded by Major Murphy, his Christian name, he does not know, and when we were stationed for a few weeks, and from which place, marched to a place called Hoggans Creek, where we were stationed a short time, and from which place we marched to Caswell, Courthouse, where our term of service expired, after being detached in small companies a while in pursuit of the Tories; - This draft was a three months tour, and about the middle of September of that year our term expired, and this applicant received a written discharge for this tour of service, either from Captain Turner, or Lieutenant Gatewood, but from which of them he does not recollect, and this applicant has also lost this discharge; and this applicant further states, that he has no documentary evidence, and knows of no person whose testimony he

who can testify to his doing, except the annexed
Affidavit of Bryant Leak, married A.

The first tour of duty of duty, this applicant
performed was as a substitute for a man by the
name of Southland (his Christian name not recalled
-rd) in North Carolina, in the month of February
to the best of his recollection, and in the year
seventeen hundred and eighty one, under Captain
Elijah Moore, and Lieutenant Wynn Dickson
in Guilford County, in said state, from Guilford
marched to a place called in the same county, and
called Ramsay's Mills on Deep River, where were
were stationed a short a time from which place
marched to a place in North Carolina called Cross Creek
in pursuit of Gorys, where in the vicinity of which
place we scouting, about in small companies in
pursuit of Gorys, until our term of service expired
this tour of three months was performed under Captain
Elijah Moore & Lieutenant Wynn Dickson, to the
best of this applicant's recollection, for he cannot state
positively from the loss of memory, that the Regiment
during this tour of duty was commanded by Colonel
William Moore, or Major Donahoe, his Christian
name not now recalled. Received a written discharge
from Captain Elijah Moore, at Hillsboro, for the
tour of duty, which is also lost, and which was
dated some time about the last of May, that year.

3 In Caswell County North Carolina, has lived since the Revolution in North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia, and now Pike County Georgia.

4 As a substitute for two Doves, of three months each, one time for Grisham, and one time for Southland, and one Dove of three months for myself as a drafted militia man.

5 I can state the names of Captain Odow, Lieutenant Parks, Captain Elijah Moore, Lieutenant Myron Dickson, Captain Perry Turner, & Lieutenant Dudley Gatewood, Col. William Moor, and Mayor Murphy, and Major Denahoe. — The following Regular officers, Genl. G. Yates, Genl. Smallwood, Col. Dickson, Genl. H. Green. — and I have already stated in my declaration the general circumstances of my service?

6th Recd a discharge from Capt. Odow, one also from Capt. Elijah Moore, and one from Capt. Perry Turner or Lieutenant Gatewood, all of which are Lost.

Madam:-

In response to your recent communication you are advised that one James Leak made an application for pension on June 25, 1833, at which time he was 69 years of age and residing in Pike County, Georgia, and his pension was allowed for nine months' actual service as a private in the North Carolina troops, Revolutionary war. He enlisted in Caswell County, North Carolina, and served under Capt. Odom and Col. Moore. He was born in Culpeper County, Virginia. This is the only James Leak found upon the Revolutionary war pension or bounty land records on file in this Bureau.

Your attention is invited to the note in the upper corner of this sheet.
