### A Study of A Family of South Carolina Planters

Motto: "Sola Virtus Invieta", translated: "Virtue alone is invincible."

Crest: A dexter arm embowed in armour ppr. garnished er, supporting with the hand an anchor also ppr.

The seal of John Miles who immigrated to South Carolina in the late 17th century bears the motto and crest described here. This crest and motto are currently displayed by the Barons Miles of Leigh Court, County Somerset, England, a family whose origins are traced back to Ledbury, County Hereford. The seal of John Miles is in the possession of a descendant.

This study is based on Miles family records kept by the late Eliza Smith Miles who was born in 1848, on the Bible of Jeremiah Miles who was born in 1780, on research in the Charleston County wills, St. Andrew's Parish Register and various other official and family records. The author is especially grateful to Miss Susan Ledson Miles and to Dr. and Mrs. Louis Smith Miles of Summerville for their assistance and encouragement. The late Miss Mabel L. Webber, sometime Editor of this Magazine, and Mrs. P. H. Horlbeck have also done extensive research on this family and their notes were most helpful.

JOHN MILES arrived in South Carolina from England not later than 1687 as proved by the fact that his eldest son, Thomas, who died 21 Feb. 1756 aged 69, was "a native of this province".<sup>1</sup> The earliest record extant of John Miles is dated 9 March 1693 when he was among those appointed to appraise the estate of Thomas Hill, deceased.<sup>2</sup> On 31 Dec. 1694 John Miles was granted 140 acres, "being upon Account of arrival rights for himself and Arnold Horskinns".<sup>3</sup> On 16 Feb. 1695 he was among those appointed to appraise the estate of Capt. Clarke.<sup>4</sup> He purchased from the Lords Proprietors 160 acres 8 April 1696<sup>5</sup> and secured a warrant for an additional 500 acres 7 April 1704,<sup>6</sup> the latter located "between Henry Samways and John Cattle". On 5 Jan. 1708 John Miles and his wife, Mary, signed an indent-selling for £ 13 26 acres on Coppins Creek, part of a 300 acre tract he owned, for glebe lands for St. Andrew's Parish. John Miles witnessed the will of his son-in-law, Richard Vincent, 23 Jan. 1719<sup>7</sup> and that of John Girardeau 24 Feb. 1721.<sup>8</sup> St. Andrew's Parish Register records his burial 28 July 1722.<sup>9</sup> The children of John and Mary Miles, all born in S. John Raven was granted a plantation he later called "Ravenwood" on 14 March 1704; he was an Executor of the Will of Thomas Townsend of Colleton County dated 10 Jan. 1733 along with John Gibbs, John and Joseph Stanyarne, Samuel Jones and Col. Alexander Nicks. John Raven, Esq. was co-executor of the 6 Sept. 1732 Will of Arthur Hall, James Island, Berkeley County, Esq. with the widow Martha and Arthur's sons-in-law Henry Perrineau and James Osmund. As Capt. John Raven he was co-executor of the 17 Apr. 1721 Will of Daniel Callahan of Colleton Co. with Callahan's son-in-law Stephen Bedon. Also as Capt. John Raven he was co-executor of the 19 Nov. 1730 Will of John Wall, planter of St. Paul's Parish, Colleton Co. with Wall's widow Rebecca.

John Raven, Jr. was co-executor of the 31 March 1730 Will of Thomas Ladson, planter, along with Ladson's wife Mary, brother William Ladson, Jr., Samuel Ladson, Jr., Moses Graves, Jr. and cousin Joseph Stanyarne, Jr.

~~THOMAS MILES (1), planter, born 1687, died 21 Feb. 1756, buried at his Poplar Springs plantation, St. Paul's Parish, together with his wife and other members of his family are buried in a second Miles Cemetery at Raven Woods, Elizabeth McPherson. The same granddaughter is on land originally granted to the immigrant, John Miles, a Miles plantation acquired either from John Raven to whom it was originally granted and entailed through Robert Miles whose son, John, divided the land on 14 March 1704, or from his heirs. land between his sons: Thomas Braly Miles who received Poplar Springs area, and Smith Miles who received Raven Woods where the cemetery is. Thomas Miles was co-executor of the will of brother-in-law Richard Vincent 23 Jan. 1719.<sup>7</sup> His own will of 16 Oct. 1751,<sup>18</sup> with codicil of 21 Feb. 1756, proved 19 March 1756, names his wife Mary, daughters Elizabeth Ladson and Margaret Hartley, brother Jeremiah, sons John, Thomas, William and Silas, grandson Richard Wickham, granddaughters Elizabeth McPherson, Elizabeth~~



Coats and Martha Wickham. His wife Mary is buried beside him, her tombstone reading: "Here lieth the body of Mary Miles who departed this life 23 October 1764, age 77 years". Her obituary notes that she was born in America 1687,<sup>1</sup> moved to S. C. 1707, names her late husband; they had "9 children, 57 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren" of whom "now remain alive 3 children, 23 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren." Her will of 1764,<sup>19</sup> proved 8 March 1765, names sons Silas and John Miles, deceased son William, daughter Margaret wife of Robert Williams, granddaughters Amelia Ladson and Mary Miles; executors were sons Silas and John and son-in-law Robert Williams.

Thomas Miles had land grants of 610 acres, 1,000 acres and 390 acres in Colleton County in 1732. Inventories of his property at his Saltcatcher and Horse Savannah plantations,<sup>20</sup> excluding real estate, totaled £ 12,045-10-1 20 May 1756. The nine children of Thomas and Mary Miles were:

Apparently Elizabeth McPherson Miles died soon after the birth of her fourth child, Susannah, in 1760, although no record thereof has been found. Her father, James McPherson, in his will of 28 September 1765 directed that his "old plantation at Saltcatchers" of 500 acres "be sold for the children of my son John and my daughter Elizabeth Miles, deceased". He omitted both John and Elizabeth when he listed his "six living children" as "Joshua, Isaac, Susannah, Job, Keziah and Ulysses", his other child, James, Jr., having been drowned in 1761. John McPherson, planter of Prince William parish, son of Capt. James and Rachel Miles McPherson, in his will of 17 Nov. 1759 made a bequest to "my sister Elizabeth Miles" and named his "brother-in-law Silas Miles" an Executor; Silas Miles and Isaac McPherson qualified as Executors when this will was proved 14 March 1763.

WILLIAM PORCHER MILES (26, 23, 18, 7, 2, 1), born at Walterboro 4 July 1822, died at Houmas House plantation, La. 11 May 1899. He spent a year at Willington Academy then graduated First Honor from the College of Charleston 1842 and was a member of its faculty 1843-1855. In the summer of 1855 he volunteered to go to Norfolk, Va. to nurse victims of a yellow fever epidemic and was presented a medal for his services by the grateful city of Norfolk. Upon his return



to Charleston he was nominated and elected Mayor of Charleston; in <sup>Trustee Col. of Chas. 1855-57 (while Mayor) and 1858-1862 (E. p. 263)</sup> 1858 he was elected to Congress and in 1860 re-elected. He signed the Ordinance of Secession 20 Dec. 1860 for the Parishes of St. Philip and St. Michael and resigned from Congress to represent the Charleston District in the Confederate Congress, serving as chairman of the committee that devised the Confederate flag and of the Committee on Military Affairs. In 1863 he married Elizabeth (Betty) Beirne, born 31 Dec. 1835, died 22 Oct. 1874, daughter of Oliver Beirne, wealthy planter of Walnut Grove plantation, Union, Monroe County, West Virginia and Louisiana, and his wife Margaret Melinda Caperton. Andrew Beirne, father of Oliver, had befriended an English immigrant boy, John Burnside, who when he died in 1881 at White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, was said by the News & Courier to have been "the richest man in Louisiana". The bachelor merchant-planter's will left his entire estate, some of which had once been owned by Gen. Wade Hampton, to Oliver Beirne.

Following the reorganization in 1880 of the University of S. C., William Porcher Miles served as its first President, resigning in 1882 to manage his father-in-law's 18,200 acres of sugar plantations in Ascension Parish, Louisiana. Residing at elegant Houmas House where he entertained lavishly, he was thereafter known as "the sugar prince". Biographies of William Porcher Miles and his four famous brothers appear in the Cyclopaedia of Eminent & Representative Men of the Carolinas. A manuscript biography through the year 1860 by Sidney Betts Paine is in the South Caroliniana Library in Columbia. Some 3,263 of the papers of William Porcher Miles, including a diary begun in 1870, are in the Southern Historical Collection of the University of North Carolina.

**R**ichardson M. Hanckel, the man who helped make Coburg Dairy the state's largest independent dairy operation, has been named to the S.C. Dairy Hall of Fame.

Hanckel, who served as president and chief executive officer of Coburg until his retirement in November 1984, was honored for "significant contributions to the industry, and his state and community," according to Jim Martin, professor of dairy science at Clemson University.

Martin made the presentation at the annual meeting of the S.C. Dairy Association and noted that Hanckel was joining a distinguished group that includes his father, Francis S. Hanckel,

Hanckel graduated from Clemson in 1948 and joined his family's dairy business full time, working in every operation from milk pro-

COLUMBIA — O. Beirne Chisolm, 93, a retired investment banker at The Heritage in Columbia, died Sunday in a local nursing home.

A memorial service will be Wednesday in Memorial Garden of St. John's in Wilderness Episcopal Church in Flat Rock, N.C., according to Dunbar's Gervais Street Chapel.

Mr. Chisolm was born in Charleston, a son of William Gregg Chisolm and Nancy Miles Chisolm. He was a graduate of Porter Military Academy and attended The Citadel. He was a 1921 graduate of the University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn. He was a Navy veteran of World War I. 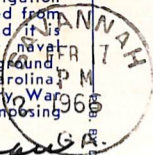






# HISTORIC and BEAUTIFUL SAVANNAH

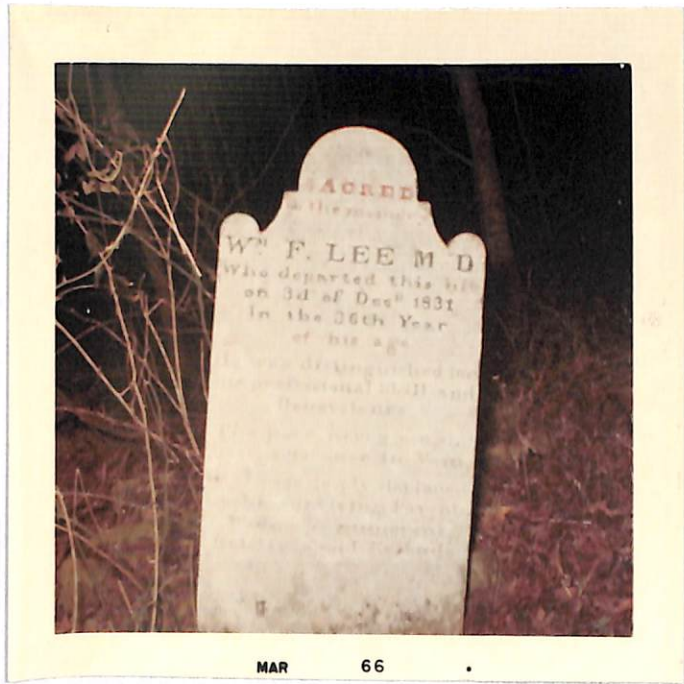




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
