Since our correspondence some time ago, we have returned to live in good ole S. C. It is, indeed, good to be back home where people speak in Southern Accents. So, if you're ever up this way, please stop by for a visit. We transferred our church membership back to the one my wife, Ruth, grew up in, and which I joined shortly after returning from World War II. Many of our old friends still attend.


In case you don't already have them, I am attaching a couple of items concerning the Peebles - Peebles family. The cemetery survey was done by the County some time ago. The Folsoms are evidently from the third wife of my Grandfather, Capt Lewis H. Peebles. No. 32 is the grave of my Great Grandmother, for whom my Mother was named. I have inserted the identity of the others where such identification is known to me.

Eleazer Pate Scarborough, who lives in Florence, is descended from Elizabeth Vermell Peebles and Henry Pate, nos. 1 and 2, page 302, and I shared the expense of clearing off the old cemetery back in the Spring. We had burned huge piles of undergrowth, after which I begged about 40 lbs. of a powerful herbicide from the railroad and applied it myself. Much to our regret, it seemed to fertilize it and the Briars have now reached the top of four ft. fence enclosing the old cemetery. The County Agent has suggested an application of a chemical called "Roundup." In pricing it at the local Goldkist store we learned that it sells for \$91.50 per gallon or \$37.50 per quart. The Agent estimates it will take 1 1/2 Qts. for the proper dilution. We hope to borrow a tank sprayer. Following this, the Agent says we must then apply another chemical which will sterilize the soil for several years. So, including labor, it is going to be quite expensive. However, it is a shame and disgrace to let it return to it's original deplorable condition. We hope to be able to take some action in the very near future before the vegetation gets completely out of hand. The prices of chemicals, like everything else, have soared in recent years.

Again, permit me to thank you for the most interesting information you sent back in 1987. It has enabled me to almost reach my goals in researching that branch of the family. I am now working some more on my father's side of the family. I was fortunate to purchase a book written by two sisters tracing the line back to the original immigrant to Va. in the 1640's and thence to Norwich England. ~~The~~ the book's Foreword they said, like Anne, that they had spent a lifetime in researching the Kings.

We hope that you and yours are happy and healthy and enjoying life.

PEEBLES FAMILY CEMETERY

Cemetery #37, Map Section D:

Location: To reach this cemetery you may travel north from downtown Bishopville on U.S. Hwy. 15 until you reach S.C. Hwy. 341. Turn left on Hwy. 341 and proceed until you come to a fork in the road. This will be S-21. Turn left on S-21 and continue past Concord Baptist Cemetery, and pass the Old Hall's (Munn's) Mill for about a mile until you see a sign on the right which points to the left. The cemetery may be found in a field behind a house which faces the highway. It is within a short distance of S-106. The cemetery is on the left.

2. This gravesite is covered with brick, which indicates to us that a marble marker, similar to # 1 at the time was located here. Mrs. ANNE (PATE) HANCOCK informs us that this is the grave of her ancestor, HENRY PATE, born in 1825 -- died Oct. 31, 1875
