Osborn married again, December 7, 1841, Jean Kerr Richardson, daughter of Dr. Henry Richardson and Mary Eraser. She was born May 29, 1811 in Beaufort. Joseph Barnwell, who lived with them in 1853, said: "Aunt Jean was a highly intelligent and well educated woman, one of the best housekeepers, and a devoted wife. . . I became very fond of him (Uncle Osborn) and his family and especially his two daughters Annie and Minnie." They had five children:

- 4. Jean Kerr Barnwell, b. Nov. 1, 1849; d. June 12, 1917.
- 5. Elizabeth Osborn Barnwell, b. Aug. 7, 1852; d. Nov. 10, 1929.

Martha Ann Barnwell, the Captain's third daughter was born May 25, 1818. After his sisters Catherine and Bower were married and her father's second wife died (1846), she became the 'mother' to her seven young half-brothers and sisters. Her nephew Joseph wrote:

"Aunt Martha was not the equal of her sisters in personal appearance. However she had the great energy and capacity for work of her father and two elder brothers. She could do in the most rapid way almost any work to which she put her hand, and she had the very kindest of hearts and was generous to a fault. She loved to keep open house and to help young and old, family or friend. She had her share of likes and dislikes, and did not restrain her tongue. In the latter part of his life, her father, then married to his third wife, allowed all the family to do pretty much as they pleased, and Aunt Martha did her share of the spending. Her health was at one time far from good, and she suffered from asthma and what was then called 'spasms.' She was always kind to me, and it was a pleasure that when I grew up I could return some of it in the way of looking after her law business.

She was devoted to spending the summer at Bay Point, the sea shore resort of Beaufort people during the season. In my day, she had a house there of her own, almost always filled with her brothers and sisters and nephews and nieces."

Elizabeth Osborn Barnwell, the fourth daughter, was born April 22, 1820. When a very young girl, Bet was sent to the school of Professor Stuart in Amherst, Massachusetts, made possible through a trust fund created by her cousin Elizabeth, daughter of Senator Robert Barnwell. Elizabeth wished to adopt Bet, but after she was married to Dr. Thomas Fuller, she felt that with all her new step-children and several of her own, this was not possible; so she established this fund for Bet's education.

While in New England, Bet met and married, November 26, 1847 in Lawrence, Massachusetts, Henry Flanders, son of Charles Flanders and Lucretia Kingsbury. Flanders was born in Plainfield, New Hampshire, February 13, 1826 and educated at the Kimball Academy in Plainfield and the Newbury Seminary in Newbury, Vermont. He studied law under his father and was admitted to the New Hampshire bar in 1845. After the death of his parents in 1850, they moved to Germantown, Pennsylvania. He was admitted to the bar in 1853 and practiced in Philadelphia, becoming a specialist on maritime law. There he wrote *The Lives of the Chief Justices of the United States* (2 vols., 1858) and was awarded an honorary M. A. by Dartmouth College in 1856. The Flanders had several children but only two survived infancy:

- 2. Lillian Barnwell Flanders, b. May 27, 1856; d. Apr. 2, 1956.


2. Amelia Louisa Rose, born in December 1827, married in 1848 Octavius Jacob Guerard, son of John Guerard of The Hill and Sophia Percy. He was born May 13, 1826 and died August 10, 1852. Amelia died January 30, 1885 leaving one son, Dr. Arthur Rose Guerard, for many years the Health Officer of the City of New York.

Ann Barnwell, Colonel Edward's fourth daughter, was born April 2, 1801 and married Lucius Cuthbert, son of James Hazzard Cuthbert, Sr. and Ann Elliott. Born December 27, 1798, he graduated from the South Carolina College in 1818 and became a planter in Beaufort. Ann died in childbirth on October 17, 1820 and was buried with her infant son in St. Helena's churchyard. Cuthbert married again, Charlotte Fuller, daughter of Thomas Fuller and Elizabeth Middleton, and died June 18, 1860; see p. 178.

Sarah Woodward Barnwell, the fifth daughter, was born February 28, 1803 and married January 18, 1823 Dr. George Mosse Stoney, son of James Stoney of Hilton Head and Elizabeth Mosse, daughter of Dr. George Mosse, a native of Ireland. Dr. Stoney was born June 18, 1795 and practiced medicine and planted in St. Luke's parish on Otterburn Plantation (770 acres) which he inherited from his father on Hilton Head. He represented St. Luke's parish in Convention in 1844 and 1846.

Dr. Stoney's first wife, Catherine Jenkins, died November 29, 1821. He died at his home in Beaufort on May 26, 1854, and Sarah on November 28, 1879. Both are buried in St. Helena's churchyard. They had five children:

1. Anne Barnwell Stoney, born May 25, 1824, married May 21, 1846 William John Graham, son of Captain John Graham of Strawberry Hill Plantation in St. Luke's Parish and Anne Barton Hogg. He was born September 16, 1824. After the war they moved to Rome, Georgia where he died February 5, 1877 and Anne on October 31, 1898. Both were buried in Myrtle Hill Cemetery, Rome.

2. Emma Barnwell Stoney, born November 5, 1837, married her cousin Middleton Stuart, son of Colonel Mid-

dleton Stuart; see p. 141.


3. Charlotte Barnwell Stoney, born November 13, 1838, married her cousin, the Rev. Nathaniel Barnwell Fuller; see p. 279.

4. Adeline Stoney, born in 1840, never married. After the war she made her home with her sister Charlotte in Texas and Miami, Florida where she died February 22, 1917.

5. George Mosse Stoney, born in 1843, was a sophomore at the South Carolina College when the war broke out. He did not marry and was killed in the war, March 19, 1865; see p. 197.

Caroline Barnwell, the sixth daughter of Colonel Edward Barnwell, was born March 9, 1805 and married Thomas Moore Rhett; see p. 165.

Emma Barnwell, the seventh daughter, was born November 30, 1806 and married January 6, 1824 Charles Heyward, son of Nathaniel Heyward, Sr. and Henrietta Manigault. He was born October 31, 1802 and educated in Charleston and at Princeton but did not graduate. Returning to the Combahee in 1821, he became a rice planter. His
