ITEM: that the said De Bordeaux made a will in writing and made Mr. James Francis Gignilliat and Mr. Peter Le Salle exors., but they dying before they intermeddled with the estate, the admin. by order of the Gov. was committed to said Poitvin the date above. Wit: Henry Wigington, Dep. Sect'y. p. 314

Dear Sir:-

I write you as President of the Lawton and Allied Families Association, at the suggestion of the Huguenot Society of South Carolina per Mrs. Edmund A Burns, Assistant Secretary.

I am shortly to go to press with a book THE HUGUENOT FAMILY DUBOURDIEU. For a long time I have known that there was a Samuel Dubourdieu who migrated to "the Santee River in the Carolinas." With that brief statement, including the date 1686 and the names of his three successive wives and their sons by him, my knowledge on this South Carolina branch of the family has stopped. Then, recently a friend of my son wrote him about DuBourdieu Beach, THE RETURN OF THE GRAY MAN by Bolick and GEORGETOWN RICE PLANTATIONS BY Lachicotte. The upshot of this has been the suggestion, as mentioned above, that I write you.

Mrs. Burns has written that the membership of your Association "is largely composed of Lawton-Jaudon-Robert-DuBourdeaux descendants." Would you be willing to share with me your store of information about the DuBourdieu family, for I presume that DuBourdeaux and DuBourdieu are different spellings of the same family.

For example, do you know of any persons of that name who are living today? If so, how can I reach them?

For your information, I am descended from the branch of the family which fled to London and from Rev. Saumarez Dubourdieu, last Huguenot minister of the French linen colony at Lisburn, Northern Ireland. It is described rather fully in Knox's IRELAND'S DEBT TO THE HUGUENOTS etc.

Thank you for your kindness and courtesy in this matter.

DE BOURDEAUX:

EVEREAUD PURGELL DU BOURDEAUX married CATHERINE FRESNE; they lived in Grenoble, France and after the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes were forced to flee for refuge as Huguenots to Canterbury, England; their son:

JACQUES DE BOURDEAUX, born Grenoble, France 1630, died ^{Charles Town} ~~Orange~~ ^{quarter}, South Carolina Dec. 1699, married c. 1675 MADELAINE GARILLOND and lived in Grenoble until 1686 when they emigrated to S. C.; he was granted 400 acres between French Quarter Creek and Cooper River on 26 July 1697; on 20 Dec. 1699 Gov. Blake issued a Warrant of Appraisement for the estate of Jacques de Bourdeaux to Jacques LeSurrier, Henry LeNoble, Pierre de St. Julien and Nicholas de Lenguemare, reciting that the said Jacques de Bourdeaux had made a will in writing which named Francis Gignilliat and Pierre LaSalle as Executors but both had died before qualifying, whereupon he appointed Anthony Poetevin, son-in-law of Jacques de Bourdeaux, Executor. On 24 Feb. 1709 Anthony de Bourdeaux, Marguerite de Bourdeaux Poetevin and Judith de Bourdeaux, as heirs of the Estate of Jacques de Bourdeaux, signed a Quit Claim to Daniel Brabant and his wife Madelaine de Bourdeaux to 500 acres of the estate of Jacques de Bourdeaux; this was the nucleus of 3,600 acre "Brabant Plantation" inherited by the Rt. Rev. Robert Smith, first Episcopal Bishop of S. C., later enlarged in 1852 to 7,615 acres by John Gordon. The six known children of Jacques and Madelaine Garillond de Bourdeaux were:

1. Marguerite de Bourdeaux, born in Grenoble, France, married c. 1695 in Carolina to Anthony ^{France Feb. 1709} Poetevin who was born in Maintenon, France, son of Anthony Poitevin and Garielle Berou. On 17 June 1725 Anthony Poitevin ^{Sw.} witnessed the will of Judith Gardon, Charles Town widow, and on 11 Sept. 1727 the will of Thomas Hepworth, Esq. of Charles Town. On 25 Jan. 1731 Francis Pagett's will left to his daughter Judith Dallas a plantation formerly belonging to Anthony Portvin. Marguerite de Bourdeaux Poetevin apparently survived her husband who died before 1709 ^{Sw.} and Anthony Poetevin married (~~Sw.~~) Hannah to whom he left his entire estate in his will of 16 May 1731, proved 27 July 1731, except for a bequest to Peter Postell, son of John Postell, Jr. who also mentioned the bequest to his son Peter by Mr. Anthony Poitevin in his own will of 26 Feb. 1732.
2. Madelaine de Bourdeaux, born in Grenoble, married in Carolina ^{Huguenot} ~~an Englishman~~, Daniel Brabant; they apparently bought out the other heirs of Jacques de Bourdeaux, securing his 500 acre estate 24 Feb. 1709. On 22 Apr. 1732 Madelaine Brabant witnessed the will of Richard Edgell; ^{they moved to Furzeburg, S.C. on 14th of Dec. 1709 (still unmarried May 1709)}
3. Judith de Bourdeaux, born in Grenoble, France was still unmarried 24 Feb. 1709 when she signed the Quit Claim for her father's estate; she married as his 2nd wife, Pierre Robert, Jr. in 1709/10, their first child, Jacques de Bourdeaux Robert, being born at Santee, S. C. 3 April 1711; he married on 27 Aug. 1735 Sarah Jaudon, dau. of Daniel and Elizabeth Jaudon of St. Denis & St. Thomas Parish, Orange Quarter, and they later moved to Prince William Parish where he died in Nov. 1774 and was buried in Stoney Creek Cemetery.
4. Anthony de Bourdeaux, born ¹⁶⁹¹ in Carolina, made his will 19 Jan. 1725, proved 19 Feb. 1725, naming his wife, Marianna, and their four sons: Anthony, James (born 1719, buried 8 Mar. 1767, married Esther Savineau and left a son Daniel Bordeaux born 1747, died 7 Jan. 1815 who married 11 Jan. 1770 Martha ("Patty") Smith, dau. of Rev. Josiah Smith & Eliz. Darrell), Daniel and Israel; Marianna de Bourdeaux was born 1690, died 26 Jan. 1767.
- * 5. Jacques de Bourdeaux, born in Carolina, apparently died before 1709.
- * 6. Israel de Bourdeaux, born in Carolina, apparently died before 1709 when his father's estate was settled.

* died before 19 Sept. 1699 when Jacques de Bourdeaux made his will leaving town lots to his three daughters: Margaret Poitevin, widow of Anthony Poitevin, Madelaine Brabant and Judith de Bourdeaux and to Anthony Bourdeaux, Joyner and only living son of Jacques de Bourdeaux. Jacques de Bourdeaux, blacksmith, of Charles Town deeded a "town lot" to James de Que, Sr.

Will dated 19 Sept. 1699 names 3 daus., 1 son. He was a blacksmith and owned the house on Broad St. at King St. now called the hiving house.
