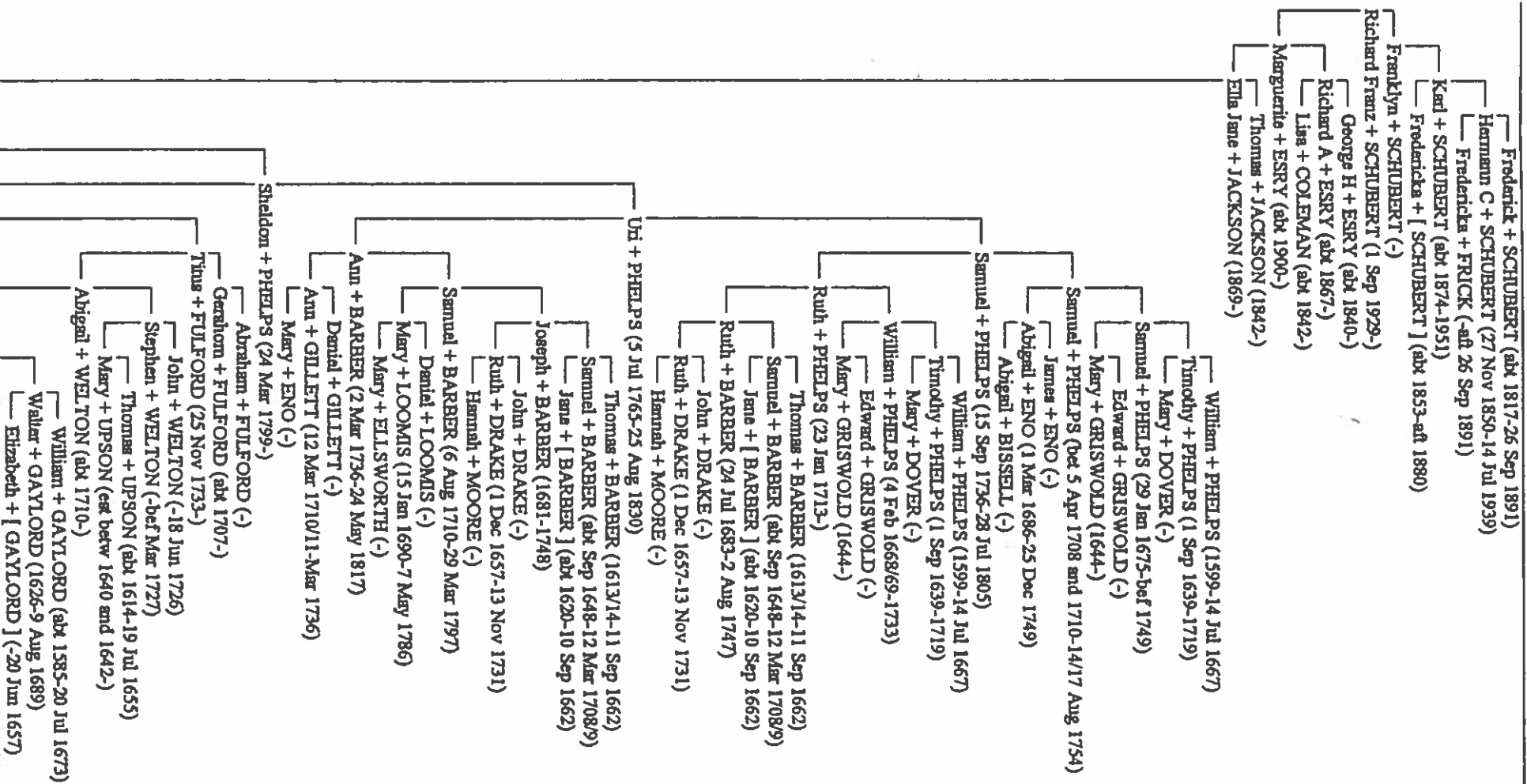


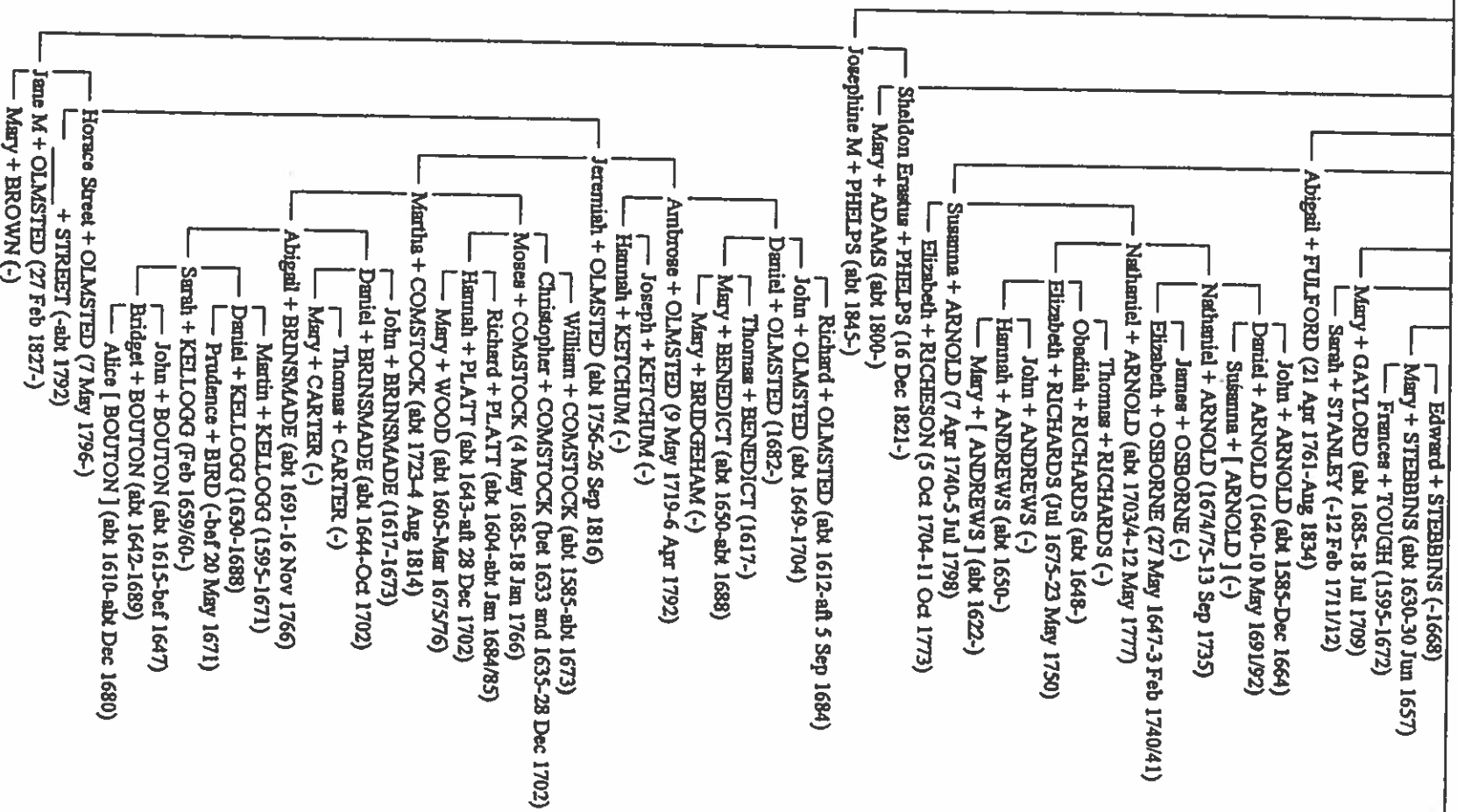

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FIRST GENERATION

1. Richard Franz + SCHUBERT was born on 1 Sep 1929 in Cleveland, Ohio. Dick married at the Gospel Church, Cleveland, Ohio, 6 Feb 1953, JUANITA EDITH McCULLOUGH, b Cleveland Heights, Ohio, 24 Mar 1929, dau John Andrew McCullough & Gladys Winifred Spellman (qv). Dick formerly worked as a systems analyst for the B F Goodrich Co, Juanita as organist for many years at Bay Presbyterian Church, Bay Village, Ohio, and currently (1996) in the same position at Rocky River Presbyterian Church, Rocky River. From about 1967 till 1994, when Dick retired, they lived at 27916 West Oakland Road, Bay Village; they have now built a distinctive new home in Hinckley, Ohio, on land through which pass the headwaters of Rocky River. The new home is characterised by its Indian motif.

SECOND GENERATION

2. Franklyn + SCHUBERT was born in Cleveland, Ohio. He was married to Marguerite + ESRY in 1928.
3. Marguerite + ESRY was born about 1900.

THIRD GENERATION

4. Karl + SCHUBERT was born about 1874 in Cleveland ? Ohio. Called "Charles" in 1880 Census where he, ae 6, and sister Emma, ae 3, are listed in family of Herman "Shubert" and his wife Fredericka. He died in 1951 in Cleveland, Ohio.
6. Richard A + ESRY was born about 1867 in Ohio. He was married to Ella Jane + JACKSON.
7. Ella Jane + JACKSON was born in 1869 in Richfield Twp, Summit County, Ohio.

FOURTH GENERATION

8. Hermann C + SCHUBERT was born on 27 Nov 1850 in Berlin, Germany. He died on 14 Jul 1939 in Cleveland, Ohio. Death certificate gives date and place of both birth and death, age at death (88 years, 7 mos, and 17 days), and names of parents, attested to by widow, Mattie C Schubert, probably his second wife. It calls him an "artist" and to the question as to the "total time (years) spent in this occupation," it says "Life." Residence at time of death was at 1263 West Blvd, Cleveland, Ohio, and burial took place 17 July, 1939, in Woodland Cemetery under auspices of Emil Klanke and the Klanke Funeral Parlor.

The 1880 Federal Census of Ohio (Roll #1005, p 357D) places him in Cleveland Ward 5 at 380 St Clair Street, as follows (269-252):

I have found that directories offer excellent clues to family groupings and relationships; they are, besides, often fascinating for what they reveal. In the early 1970s I spent hours perusing them for my Schubert research. Every year for which there was a directory was searched, from 1932 back as far as 1837. He was married to Lisa + COLEMAN about 1862.

13. Lisa + COLEMAN was born about 1842 in Canada. Was aged 38 according to 1880 Census, Cleveland, Ward 10, Ohio, Roll #1007, p 112C. I was told by Marguerite (Esry) Schubert in the late 1960s that her grandmother, "Lisa Coleman," was

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Irish. According to this 1880 census schedule, "Elisa" was born in Canada but both her parents are recorded as being born in Scotland. Marguerite (Esry) Schubert informed me Lisa Coleman "was Irish." 1880 Census has her born in Canada and her father and mother both born in Scotland, not Ireland (see note for George H Esry). ...RGWS.

14. Thomas + JACKSSON was born in 1842 in England. Born in England according to 1870 Census, in which he is described as then ae 28 and living at Richfield Township in Summit County, Ohio. In 1880 Census, Thomas's family is shown thus:

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FIFTH GENERATION

16. **Frederick + SCHUBERT** was born about 1817 in Prussia. Birth date based on death certificate, 1891, which states he was then 73 years of age. Have note saying he was born 30 Nov 1817, but find no source for this. RGWS. He died on 26 Sep 1891 in Cleveland, Ohio. Death certificate says aged 73 and married at the time, living at 140 Dana Street in Cleveland. Buried at Woodland Cemetery. He was married to **Fredericka + FRICK** about 1840.

17. **Fredericka + FRICK** died after 26 Sep 1891. According to her husband's death certificate, 1891, which states he was living at the time and in Cleveland. She was born in Prussia.

30. **Sheldon Erastus + PHELPS** was born on 16 Dec 1821 in Harwinton, Connecticut. Exact date and place of birth found in IGI at LDS Family History Center, Bloomfield, Ct, 13 Apr 1996. Sheldon Phelps is listed in the 1860, 1870, and 1880 censuses as residing in the same Ohio town - Richfield, in Summit County - as noted below. It was about 1970 that I researched the 1870 census; it was not until April 1996 that I had access to the 1860 and 1880 census schedules listing this family.

In IGI at LDS Family History Center, Bloomfield, Ct, on 13 Apr 1996, found Sheldon's exact date and place of birth, 16 Dec 1821, at Harwinton, Litchfield Co, Ct, with a relative's name given as Hyram Smith Phelps. His marriage to "Jane M Olmsted" is given as in Summit Co, Ohio, on 3 Apr 1844.

Judge Oliver Seymour Phelps and Andrew T Servin's "The Phelps Family of America," Pittsfield, MA, 1899, a two-volume work I found at the Connecticut State Library, traces Sheldon's ancestry back eight generations to William Phelps (1599-1672), an early settler of Windsor, Connecticut. I have relied on this as reasonably accurate for all the Phelps "name line" ancestors entered in this "Family Origins" program. The entry for Sheldon (the last of his line to be entered in the Phelps & Servin book) runs as follows:

"8105. Sheldon Erastus Phelps, b Harwinton, Ct, 16 Dec 1821, m _____, Mr. Phelps settled in Richland, Ohio. Had three children." [With the help of the Census data above we think the number of children likely to have been more correctly seven or more.]

He was married to Jane M + OLMSTED on 3 Apr 1844 in Summit County, Ohio.

31. **Jane M + OLMSTED** was born on 27 Feb 1827 in Monroe Co, NY. 1860 Census of Ohio, Summit Co, Richfield Twp, shows Jane as born in New York State, but both her parents having been born in Connecticut. In the IGI today, 13 Apr 1996,

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found her exact date of birth, also Monroe as New York State county where she was born, plus the names of her parents!

SIXTH GENERATION

60. Sheldon + PHELPS was born on 24 Mar 1799 in Harwinton, Connecticut. The Phelps genealogy is obviously in error as to dates for this Sheldon Phelps, the entry stating (p 783) that he, b Harwinton, 24 Mar 1799, m 1 Feb 1826, Mary Adams; that he died Harwinton, 2 Feb 1824, two years before his marriage! This will have to be researched. In the work just mentioned, Sheldon's children are shown as:

Horace Street + OLMSTED was born on 7 May 1796 in Monroe Co, NY. 1880 Census of Ohio would indicate both Horace Street Olmsted and his wife Mary Brown were born in Connecticut, but article in Rochester Union, 1858, would seem to contradict this, which calls his brother Harry the "oldest inhabitant" of Monroe County, his father Jeremiah having brought him there in 1794 when Harry was eight. The date of birth supplied for Horace by the Olmsted Family Genealogy, 1912, is 7 May 1796, but this may be incorrect, as it follows immediately the name of his wife Mary Brown. If on the other hand, this is the correct date, then Horace was born two years after his parents removed to New York State. However, his brother Harry could well have been the "oldest inhabitant" of Monroe County by 1858, depending upon when Horace died or moved away! My conjecture is that the year of birth may more likely be about 1788. RGWS. The Olmsted Family Genealogy says of Horace Street Olmsted only that he was born 7 May 1796 (but see birth note), that he married Mary Brown, and that he had the following nine children, all presumably b Monroe County, NY:

Moses (3) Comstock was son of Christopher (2) & Hannah (Platt) Comstock of Fairfield and Norwalk. Christopher (2) was probably the son of William (1) Comstock and came with him from England. William resided at Wethersfield, though finally at New London. This, says correspondent, is from the "Comstock Genealogy," of those below, probably that of 1907.

Dinah Hanford; grandsons Moses Hanford, son of Samuel Hanford, and Moses Comstock Eells, son Abijah executor, David Comstock a witness. The will gives to his wife Abigail the life use and improvement of my negro man Caesar, my mulatto boy John, and negro woman, Bett'. ... William C. Bryant, in his 'Letters of a Traveller,' tells the following story of Moses (3): 'He prided himself on the strict and literal fulfilment of his word. On one occasion he had a law-suit with one of his neighbors before a justice of the peace, in which he was cast and ordered to pay ten shillings damages, and a stilling as the fees of court. He paid the ten shillings and asked the justice whether he would allow him to pay the remaining stilling when he next passed his door. The magistrate readily consented, but from that time old Comstock never went by his house. Whenever he had occasion to go

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to church or to any other place the direct road to which led by the justice's door, he was careful to take a lane which passed behind the dwelling and at some distance from it. The shilling remained unpaid up to the day of his death, and it was found that in his last will he had directed that his corpse should be carried by that lane to the place of interment.'

"His daughters, Sarah and Phebe, remained unmarried, and carried on a fine farm. They had a slave Onesimus bought for 39 pounds, 9 Aug., 1773. Both being mounted, he used to ride after Miss Phebe when she went into Norwalk. Phebe's will of 22 Feb., 1810, gives her servant Onesimus to her niece Phebe Cornstock, and the will of the latter of 14 Nov., 1840, charges Datin Ferris with the care of Onesimus during life.

Christopher moved to Norwalk before 1663, became an innkeeper, and was nominated for freeman of Conn. Colony 10 Oct 1667. He served as Deputy from Norwalk to the Conn. General Assembly in Oct. 1686, May and June 1689, and May 1690. In 1692 he served on the grand jury which indicted Mercy Dishow and others for witchcraft. His will, dated 22 Dec. 1701, was proved 4 Jan. 1702/3, and named wife Hannah, sons Moses and Samuel, daughters Hannah Comstock and Mercy Comstock, every grandchild was to have a Bible; his wife and son Samuel to be executors and friends Rev. The first two children, Mary and Thomas, were, states this book, possibly by the first wife, the others - Hannah, Elizabeth, and Stephen - all by the second wife and born in Farmington.

From the little information available, it would appear possible that Mary was born as early as 1640, if a two-year interval between children is posited. Even if the spacing were one-year intervals, if Mary was indeed the first child, it would still be very unlikely that her mother was Elizabeth Fuller. If, on the other hand, Mary were simply the "eldest daughter," as Savage lists the children, it could place her as the third child, making a birth date of even 1647 a possibility.

Cyrus Comstock says there is mention in a Wettersfield, Ct, land record of 28 Feb 1641 of "the lands of William Comstock which he purchased of Ric. Milles lying in Wettersfield on Connecticut River." He goes on to say that "beginning in 1635 and

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1636 there was a considerable emigration from Wadestown, Mass., and its vicinity to Wethersfield, Windsor, and Hartford, Ct., and William Comstock may have been among the emigrants. * Henry R Stiles, in his "History of Wethersfield," (Hartford, Ct, 1892), Cyrus Comstock continues, "says we may be pretty sure that William Comstock was among the 26 from Wethersfield, Ct., in the expedition commanded by Capt. John Mason which captured the Pequot Fort at Mystic, Ct., 26 May, 1637, killing about 500 Indians."

Among other particulars, Comstock adds, "William Comstock at New London town meeting 10 Nov., 1650, voted to cooperate with John Winthrop in erecting a corn mill... Old Goodman Comstock was chosen sexton to order youth in the meeting, etc., 25 Feb., 1662; the title 'old Goodman' would indicate a birth as early as 1590."

Absolute proof of the children's parentage may never come forth, but it may be of interest to note what Cyrus Comstock has to say:

"That William had children John and Daniel, is shown by a deed of 4 Dec., 1694 in which William (3) Comstock of Lyme (son of John (2) of Lyme) and Daniel (3) Comstock of New London, convey land at Nyantik which said land was given to our grand father William Comstock deceased, by the town of New London, 20 acres. The same 20 A. were granted by New London to William Comstock 21 June, 1647. Savage, (Genealogical History of New England) says John Comstock who was at Weymouth, Mass., in 1639, sat down at Saybrook, east part, now Lyme. Mr. S. C. Newman states that Daniel Comstock moved from Providence to New London. Daniel Comstock of Providence, 19 Feb., 1645, accepts from Providence a free grant of 25 A. of land. The 24 of June, 1648, Daniel Comstock with other young men were arrested in Providence for giving a false Indian alarm. In 1660 Daniel Comstock was paid twenty shillings by New London for killing a wolf toward Molegan. The facts that Samuel and Daniel had adjoining lots in Providence; that Samuel named a son Daniel; that Daniel named a son Samuel; that William (1) and a Samuel were both in the jurisdiction of Hartford in 1648; that the Samuel who was in the Sybando expedition in 1653. ... was in that year both in New London and Rhode Island; give rise to the presumption that Samuel (2) of Providence was the son of William (1) of New London."

Of particular interest is Christopher Comstock of Fairfield, later of Norwalk, Ct. Comstock writes, "Christopher ... made an affidavit about visiting good wife Knapp, charged with being a witch, at New Haven, 29 May 1654. He named three of his children Elizabeth, Daniel, and Samuel, these being the names of the wife and two sons of William (1) Comstock of New London. William (1) and Christopher (2) were both in Connecticut in 1654. These facts suggest that Christopher (2) was a son of William (1)..."

"These are the reasons for supposing that John Comstock of Weymouth, Mass., and Lyme, Ct.; Samuel Comstock of Providence, R. I.; Daniel Comstock of Providence, R. I., and New London, Ct.; and Christopher Comstock of Fairfield, Ct., and Norwalk, Ct., were sons of William Comstock of New London."

Agreement of heirs of John Binsmade of Stratford was signed, 3 Nov 1673. He left widow Mary, sons John, Daniel, Paul, and Samuel, daus Mary Bostwick and Elizabeth Binsmade. (It was signed also by John Bostwick, Mary did not sign.) The inventory was valued at £519, and shows he was a blacksmith, owned land at Stratford and Derby, and had about 60 books.

"It is not known," writes Hopkins, "when he came to New England, but it is probable that he came with his brother Joseph. He was one of the early settlers of Norwalk, which was incorporated 11 Sept., 1651, and his name appears in the list of those to appear in Towne Meetings' 20 March, 1656. In the first book of Land Records in Norwalk, his home lot is described as four acres bounded east by Matthew Marvin, Jr.'s, Matthew Marvin, Sen's, and Thomas Fitch, Sen's home lots, west by Joseph Fenn's home lot and a bank of common land, north, partly by Nathaniel Richard's home lot and by the 'Coase banck,' south by town highway. The records of the first grants in Norwalk are interspersed with others from 1670 to 1690. Many of these deed are without date. Over some of the records, in another hand is the date 1652.

"It is said that he was the largest man of the pioneers, being more than seven feet in height, and 'of proportionate dimensions otherwise.'

"He was one of Norwalk's antiquity-athletic men. He was muscular and manly. One one occasion he was visiting in his neighborhood and found that two Indians, who were callers at the same time, had so far forgotten English propineties as to have engaged in an angry and violent wrangle within the white man's abode. Mr. Kellogg stepped forward and in a very business like manner rubbed the heads of the red natives vigorously together and taught them a lesson.'

"He was selectman of Norwalk in 1670; Representative to the General Court, 1670, '72, '74, '75, '77, '79, '80 and '83.

"He was on the committee, 23 April, 1673, to carry on the work of building the meeting house. On the 8 Nov., 1681, the town ordered the committee to remove the desk, seats and planks from the old meeting house to the new, and the town for the future to meet in the sayd new meeting house to weight upon the Lord in his divine publique worshipp as opportunite presents.'

"At a meeting, 25 Dec., 1669, the town voted that 'all the lands within the bounds of Norwalk, that are at present undivided, shall for future be divided only to such as are the present proper inhabitants of this town,' and at a meeting 9 Feb., 1671, it was voted that 'every one of our inhabitants that have not as yet had any estate for their children shall have five pounds for every child now in being; to be added to their father's estate, and this is to take place in the land that is now laid out in ye Indian field and not before.'

"In a list of children of the town Feb., 1672, Daniel Kellogg appears to have six. He drew his share of the common lands of the town, which made him a large landed proprietor.

"In 1672, his estate in Norwalk was valued at £125.

"In 1685 the General Court of Connecticut made an order that every township should take a patent from the Court, 'for the holding of such tracts of land as have been formerly or shall hereafter be granted to them by this Court, etc.' In pursuance of this order, Norwalk took out a patent, dated 8 July, 1686. In this patent, 'Mr. Daniel Kellogg' is named as one of the present proprietors of the Town of Norwalk.'

"The inventory of his estate, made Dec., 1688, was filed 5 March, following, by Bridget Kellogg, his relict. In this, it is stated that his children were Sarah, Mary and Rachel, who were married and away; Elizabeth, about 20 years of age; Daniel, 18 next May; Samuel, 15; Lydia, 13 next April; Benjamin and Joseph, twins, 11 years old.'

"The eldest son, Daniel, to have a double portion of the hole estate to be taken out of the housings and lands, the other sons to have twice as much as the daughters. The administrators are ordered to husband and take all prudent care of the estate and

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children; married children to be paid within one year, sons to be paid when 21; unmarried daughters when 18 or upon marriage."

Barber writes (op cit), "Before coming to New England, Thomas was apprenticed under Francis Stiles, a master carpenter from Millbrook, Bedfordshire, England. Stiles was contracted by Sir Richard Saltonstall to build houses in America for Englishmen who were to follow. Thomas Barber at the age of 21 was among the twenty apprentices plus others who sailed with Stiles for New England in the ship 'Christian' (John White, Master), which left London 16 Mar 1634 (Julian Calendar), and arrived 3 months later in Boston June 1635.

"Each of the passengers had a certificate which read in part: 'with certificate from St. Mildred, Bread Street, London, and having taken the oaths, to be transported to New England from London in the Christian' (from the Public Record Office, Westminster Hall, London).

"After 10 days at Boston the Christian sailed up the Connecticut River to Windsor, arriving there on the first of July 1635. That same year Thomas was granted a lot of a few acres, extending from Mill Brook, near the old Watham gristmill, north along both sides of Poquonock Avenue. The author's father was born on this same land, and my brother, sister, and I were brought up on this, the original land grant. After 330 years of continuous Barber ownership, the land has now all been sold.

"The Pequot War in 1637, precipitated by the Pequot Indians by their continual harassment of both the settlers and the friendly Mohicans, found Thomas, a Sergeant, one of 30 soldiers from Windsor under the leadership of Captain John Mason. The night attack was a complete surprise to the Pequots, and a large percentage of the tribe was massacred. Thomas Barber's bravery (he was inside the Pequot Fort at Mystic during the attack), gained him honorable mention from Capt. Mason, and in return for this service, in 1641 he was granted 600 acres of land in Massaco, in the western part of Windsor. Massaco became Sinsbury in 1669.

"The year 1645 found Thomas still an apprentice carpenter. Stiles apparently was slow to finish Thomas's apprenticeship, and needed a court order to force him to do so.

"From then on Thomas was a free man. At the time of his death in 1662, Thomas was making preparations to move to Northampton, MA.

"There were a multitude of Barber families in Bedfordshire and other parts of England in the 1500's and 1600's, several including Thomases, leaving us uncertain to this day about Thomas's ancestry. A deeper mystery surrounds Jane, his wife. He married her in 1640, but the record gives only the name Jane or Joan. Two of Thomas's sons married Coggin ladies, but there is no sign that Jane was a Coggin, as some have suggested. One of Francis Stiles' sisters was named Jane, born 1605. She married in England and presumably remained there. There was a Jane Morden or Worden, age 35, on the passenger list of the

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Christian, however I know nothing further about her. It seems she was too old to have borne all of Thomas's children.

Hopkins says Martin (who did not emigrate to New England) was a weaver or cloth worker who resided at Great Leighs and Braintree. Various legal documents ("surrenders" of rights, acres, and tenements) are presented helping to show where the Kelloggs were living, and which, incidentally, contain references to names of other ancestors common to Richard F Schubert and R G Windsor Spellman - most particularly, Deacon Edward Stebbing [or Stebbins], in Cambridge, Mass., by 1633 and an

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original proprietor of Hartford, 1636, and Richard Skinner, also an original proprietor of Hartford and also from Braintree
Hopkins provides the following excerpts:

"Whereas at the Court on Monday in Easter week, 11 James I, A.D. 1613, Joseph Mann surrendered one acre and a half of land, parcel of acroft called Harold's Croft, lying at Minche's Oak, on which same land a messuage had been lately built. To the use of Mark Stebbing and Mary his wife for their lives, and then to Edward Stebbing, their son and his heirs. Now Mark, Mary, and Edward are admitted....."

"Afterwards the said Mark, Mary and Edward and Thomas Stebbing, another son, surrendered all their right in the aforesaid premises after the death of Mary Bead, formerly wife of Michael Mann, to the use of Robert Kellogg and his heirs, and the same Robert is admitted."

"Afterwards Robert Kellogg surrendered one tenement in the occupation of the said Thomas Stebbing and two small cottages to the same adjoining part of the property which the said Robert purchased of Edward and Thomas Stebbing, to the use and behoof of Martin Kellogg and Prudence, his wife, and the heirs of the said Martin forever, which same Martin and Prudence are admitted."

In 1637, Hopkins continues, Martin Kellogg received the surrender of a parcel of land with a cottage called Masses as appears from the following extract from the same Court Rolls. Part of this cottage is still standing [1903] in what is "Martin's Yard."

"Whereas at the Court held 13 April, 13 Charles I, A.D. 1637, Richard Skinner was admitted on the surrender of Richard Sparhawk, amongst other things, to one parcel of land containing by estimation nine perches upon which a cottage has been lately built with part of a pond called a Fuller's Pond, etc. It is now that on the 8th of April last (i.e. A.D. 1641) the said Skinner had surrendered the premises, by the name of one customary cottage called 'Masses,' otherwise 'Masse's tenement' (then in the tenure of John Gowell or Cowell) to the use and behoof of Martin Kellogg of Braintree, weaver, and his heirs. The same Martin is admitted."

Hopkins tells us that on 3 Apr 1648 Martin surrendered a part of this tenement to his son John, as would appear from an extract under his name. Martin appeared in the Archbishop's Court at Braintree, 1639 and 1640, in company with the parish vicar, and we may presume on this basis Martin was one of the church wardens.

Martin made his will, 20 May 1671, which was as follows (original spelling):

"IN THE NAME OFF GOD AMEN this 20th day of May in the yeare of our Lord 1671 I, MARTIN KELLOCKE of Braintree in the county of Essex Weauer beinge sick in bodie but of a perfecte memorie praised be god ther^efor doe make & ordaine this my last will & testamente in writinge in manerand forme followinge that is to say First & principally I comend my soule into the hands of almighty god my maker trustinge in the allsuffisante merits of Jesus Christe my Sauour & redemer to obtaine Eternall life and Salvation and my bodie vnto the earth from whence it came to be decently buried by my Executor which shall be hereafter nominated & appointed Item I giue and bequeath vnto Sarah my daughter the wife of William Jacob five pounce lawfull money of England to ne paide within on yeare After my decease Item I giue vnto my grandchild John Kellocke twenty shillings to be paid vnto him within two years after my decease Item I giue & bequeath vnto my sone Joseph Kellocke of new England twenty shillings to be paide to him within on yeare after my decease Item I giue and bequeath vnto my sone Daniell Kellocke of new England five pound lawfull monie of England to be paid vnto him within two years after my deceasse Item I giue & bequeath vnto my sone Nathaniel Kellocke all my goods in my best chamber & my little copper and all my wearinge apparrell to be deliuered to him present After my deceasse Item I giue vnto my sone Martin Kellocke my coppie hold house wherin I now dwell with the yard and garden & with all and singuler the appurtenances therunto belonginge & my coppie hold tenemente wherein John Watts now dwelleth with all the appurtenances therunto belonginge and my parter that I now hold in my own hands whome I doe nominate & appointe make and ordaine to be my wholle and sole executor to se my will fullfilld & performed accordinge to the tru meaninge & intente of it and I doe make ordaine & declare this to be my very last will and testamente Reuokinge all other wills formerly by me made either in worde or writinge in witness wherof I herunto set my hand & sealle the day & yeare first aboue written -- The marke of MARTIN M KELLOCKE (LS) Read signed sealed published and declared to be the last will and testament of the testator in the presence of us -- Signed JOHN D DEWDAT Senor -- DANIEL CLARKE.

Proved at Braintree 20th September 1671...."

"Item, I doe give after my decease, to my daughter Brigit Kellock my scarfe and my best cloath waskcoat and my best serg coat and my best green apron and the best of my two under cotten coats and my spectacles."

"Item, I doe give unto my daughter Abigail Bowton my best hat and my best cloke and my serge waskcoats and my under cotten waskcoat and a pair of lether gloves, 2 brass small wayts."

"Item, I doe give to my daughter Rachell Smith my penne [stone?] coat and my flannel waskcoat, and to my grandchild Sarah Bainsmead my Chest; and to my grandchild Ruth Bowton my brass kettle 3 old pewter dishes and a brass Chafendish and a gypot; and to my grandchild Rachell Bowton my Bible."

Remainder. "my will is shall be devided between my two daffter Brigit Kellock and Rachell Smith. The hetchell my will is, half to my sonn John Bowton and half to my daughter Brigit Kellock," etc.
