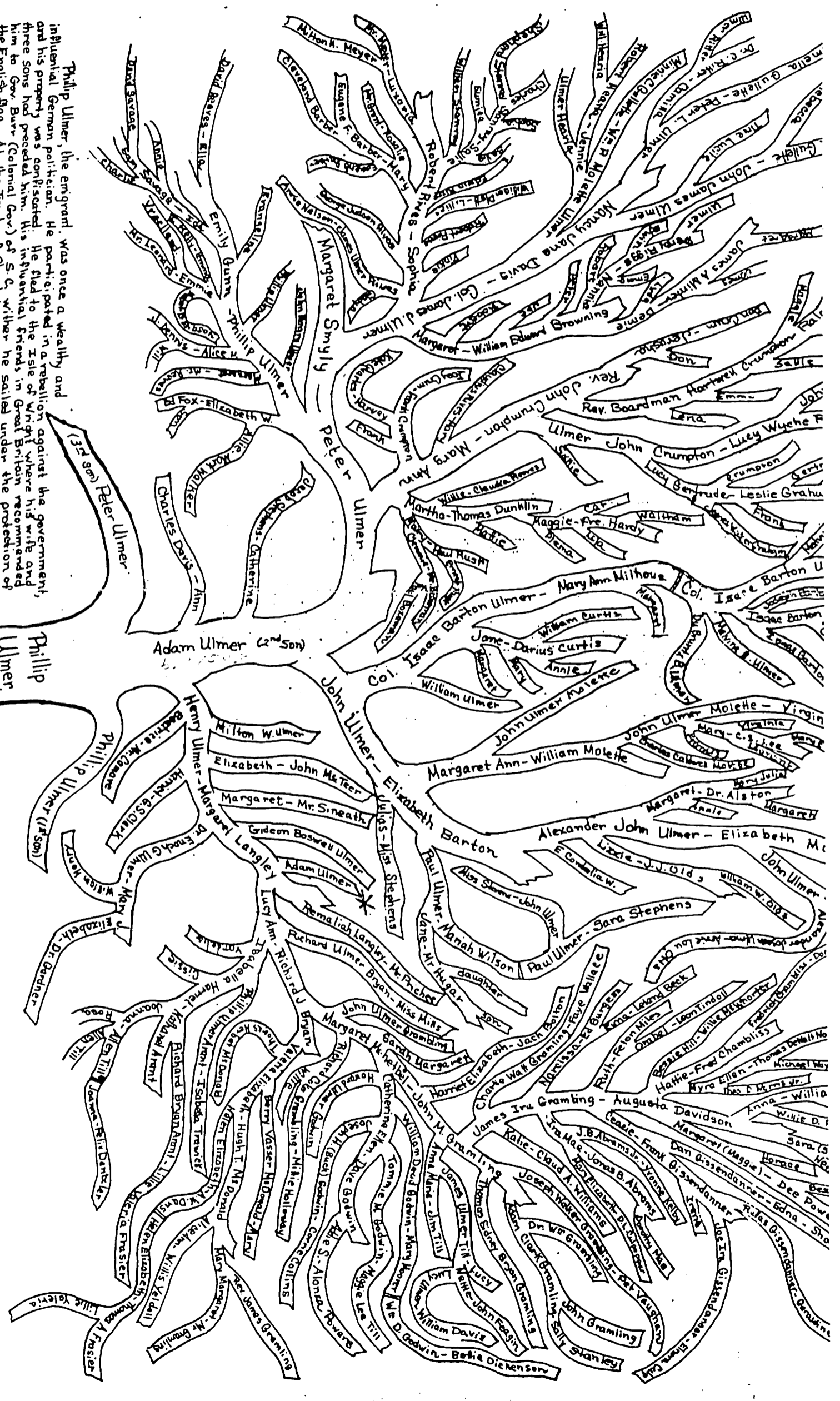


Phillip Ulmer, the emigrant, was once a wealthy and influential German politician. He participated in a rebellion against the government, and his property was confiscated. He fled to the Isle of Wight where his wife and three sons had preceded him. His influential friends in Great Britain recommended him to Gov. Burr (Colonial Gov) of S. C. wither he sailed under the protection of the English flag. At the Treaty of Ghent his property was restored to him, and Adam Ulmer's eldest son, Henry, was educated with the view of his being sent back to Germany to claim the property, but he did not go and it is supposed the property was escheated back to the government or claimed by relatives who remained in Germany. Phillip Ulmer and his wife both died of small pox and their three sons were left in South Carolina. The descendants of Phillip's (1st son) and Peter (2nd son) are in Mississippi and Georgia. Those of Adam the 2nd son, are in Alabama and South Carolina.

This information is taken from the family history in the possession of Col. Barton Ulmer, Marengo County, Alabama, by Mrs. Martha Gullette Ulmer of Mobile, Alabama in 1894.

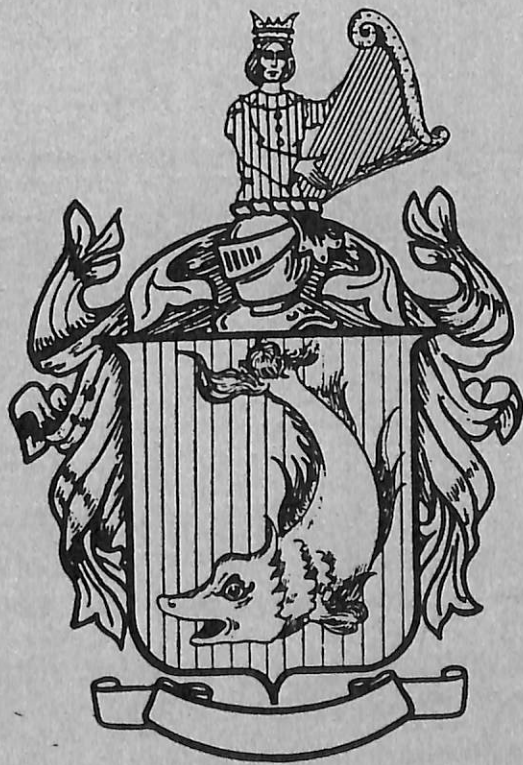

The Ulmer family of Bluffton, S.C.

The presence of the Ulmer family in South Carolina seems to begin with Phillip Ulmer, who, according to the family history in the possession of Col. Barton Ulmer, Marengo Co, Alabama, was a wealthy and influential German politician. He participated in a rebellion against the government and his property was confiscated. He fled to the Isle of Wight where his (second) wife (Anna Guerry Gates) and three sons had preceded him. His influential friends in Great Britain recommended him to Gov. Burr (Colonial Gov.) of SC, and he consequently sailed there under the protection of the English flag. At the Treaty of Ghent his property was returned to him but he remained in SC, where both he and his wife died of smallpox, leaving his three sons and their descendants to make South Carolina, particularly the Orangeburg and Charleston districts, their home. The descendants of firstborn Phillip and third born Peter are in Mississippi and Georgia. Those of Adam can be found in Alabama and in South Carolina. We are most interested in the descendants who remained in South Carolina. The first Ulmer family reunion was held in Heidelberg, Mississippi in 1973. There were 250 guests from ten different states, including Alabama, Arizona, Florida, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Mississippi, New Jersey, New Mexico, Texas, and Virginia. South Carolina was not, apparently, represented!

According to Dan Ulmer, author of the family history, Adam Ulmer landed in the "new world" on 12 October 1738 from Germany (he obtained his information from The Swiss Immigrants And 3000 Names of Immigrants.) Jacob Ulmer landed in Charleston, SC in July, 1735 with four sons: Hans (Henry), Michael, Warner, and John Frederick. Jacob was living on land in "Halfway Swamp," Orangeburg County, SC in 1754.

In the 1790 Census, the first ever, there is an Adam Ulmer listed in Orangeburg, SC: total number of persons in household are 11 (number of slaves is 6) Included in the eleven are "2 free white males under 16 years of age, 1 free white male over 16, and 2 free white females". The "next" Adam Ulmer, born in 1780, is presumed to be one of the 2 free white males listed in the household. He would have been 10 years old. This presumed "first" Adam Ulmer (1750-1798, other sources show his year of birth 1730) married Margaret Ann LeGrand, daughter of Isaac Le Grand of Charleston, SC (son of Jean LeGrand and Marie Dieu of Normandy) Another source shows that he married a Mary Ann Fletcher. (according to Mary S. Molett's 1974 letter to the Hilton Head Historical Society, which preceded the Heritage Library) Yet another source lists Adam's wife as simply "Ann" (at least the other two names contain the name Ann!) According to Wm. Rudolph Bauer, in his "Sineath Family and Affiliated Family Lineages", They appear to have had five children: 1) John, 2) Peter, 3) Henry, b. 1770, m. Margaret Langley, 4) Anna Geurry Ulmer, m. Charles Davis, 5) Catherine, m. Jacob Stephens. Their first child, John, owned a plantation called "Ulmers", which included land that is now Rose Hill Plantation. John Ulmer (29 Sept 1773 – 27 June 1820) married Elizabeth Barton (23 Feb 1778 – 02 Jan 1833) on February 20, 1795, whose mother was a Fletcher, and had a child, Margaret Ann Ulmer, born October 30, 1795, who ultimately married William Page Molett in June of 1815. The couple had a son named John Ulmer Molett, born on 12 Feb 1817 and moved to Alabama in 1818, according to a letter written to the

Historical Society by Mary S. Molett (Mrs. Grant H. Mollet) of New Orleans, LA in 1974. John and Elizabeth (Barton) Ulmer are buried in Rose Hill Plantation.

It is an interesting fact that one of the Adam Ulmers left Orangeburg, SC in 1811 to seek his fortune in Oklahoma during the Gold Rush. There had been an earthquake. When he returned, the rivers and lay of the land had been altered, and he and his family ended up in the flat lands of the Mississippi territory, settling on Whiskey Creek, which is now Perry County, MS. (Daniel Ulmer, Ulmer family history)

There is a brief mention of an Adam Ulmer in the 1800's Census. He resides in the town of Prince William's Parish, county of Beaufort, state of SC. 1780 is the residence year, and under "remarks" it is stated that he appears on the Grand Jury List for the District of Beaufort. If he is the same Adam Ulmer born in 1750, he would be 30 years old at this time... or 50 if he was born in 1730.

Adam's brother Henry (b.1770) married Margaret Langley (b.1772 in Charleston Dist., SC) They had nine known children, listed here, not necessarily in birth order: 1) Nellie Margaret, b. 30 July 1805, d. 11 Sept 1877. Married Ichabod Sineath. 2) Remeliah Langley, b. 8 Dec 1815, d. 5 July 1891. Married Wm. Preacher. 3) John Milton, b. 1819, d. 26 Jan 1868. Married Mary Breland. 4) Harriet Ulmer, m. George Clark. 5) Beatrice Ulmer, m. David Cannon. 6) Enoch G., m. Mary Curtis, d. 1859. 7) Gideon, b. 1812, m. A. Martha Sineath. 8) Nancy Ann, m. Richard Bryant. 9) Elizabeth "Betsey", m. John McTeer. Child number 6, Dr. Enoch G. Ulmer was born in Colleton County, SC and died in 1859. He is buried at Selma or Bessemer, Alabama. He settled in Alabama and was a surgeon. He graduated from the Medical College of SC, Charleston in 1837. He married Mary J. Curtis, born in Bessemer, Alabama. They had one child, Eliza, who married a Mr. or Dr. Gardner who was a NY stockbroker. They had no children but adopted a child named Maude. Eliza (or Elizabeth) Ulmer Gardner was a concert pianist who died in California.

The information on these early Ulmers, found in "Sineath Family.." by Bauer agrees with the detailed family tree provided by Addie C. Crumpton, obtained by Col. Barton Ulmer of Marengo, Co. Alabama and Martha Gullette Ulmer of Mobile, Alabama, 1894. This family tree drawing is very detailed and ornate, a real work of art! Hopefully, it is also historically accurate.

Familysearch (Orangeburgh German-Swiss Genealogical Society) revealed an Adam Ulmer born in 1780. He died between 1850 and 1860 in Jasper County, Mississippi, where he migrated in 1812. He was the son of George A. Ulmer (b. 1754) and Mary Margaret (Horger) Ulmer, who married in 1801. George A. was the son of John Frederick Ulmer and Mary Barbara (Shuler) Ulmer. John Frederick and Mary Barbara were married in 1752 in Orangeburg Township, SC. Mary Barbara Shuler is descended from Hans George Shuler and Catherine Anna Margaretha (Hessy) Shuler. We know that Catherine was born in 1695. Family Search also shows a ("Baron"?) Heinrich Phillip (Von) Ulmer (c. 1739 – c. 1755) who came to the U.S. to escape religious and legal persecution, who was married to widow Anna Guerry Gates (Telle Baumgarden was his

first wife). This union resulted in an Adam Ulmer born in Beaufort in the year 1730. Adam marries Ann Fletcher, born 1734. (Not Margaret Ann LeGrand?)* They marry in 1773 and have at least two children, sons Henry, born in 1770 (previous marriage?), and William John, born in 1773. Although Heinrich died in Prince William's Parish, Beaufort, SC, This line of Ulmers appears to have ultimately migrated to Jasper County, which later became Perry County, Mississippi. According to Laurence H. Ulmer, in *Our Ulmer Heritage*, Ulmer descendants also migrated to Georgia, Alabama, and elsewhere.

*Contrary to that scenerio, according to a 1987 letter by Ruth B. Elsom to "cousin" Robert Peebles, is that Adam marries a *LeGrand*. It is also written that Adam is born in 1750 and died in 1798. Fletcher was the name guessed by a relative's grandfather, and the remark was never properly checked. Dr. Peeple's cousin does note that the name Fletcher factors into the Ulmer line. Her research agrees with Bauer ("Sineath Family and Affiliated Family Lineages") that Adam and Margaret Ann (or Ann Margaret) had a son named John Ulmer who owned the plantation known as Ulmers (present day Rose Hill land, not the house but the land) and that John Ulmer married Mary Ann Barton, whose mother was a Fletcher. Adam has a son Peter (b. 1782 – d. Circa 1806) who married Margaret Caldwell Smyly (20 May 1782 – 09 Nov 1847). Ruth B. Elsom is an Ulmer and Youmans descendant. She is related to the Ulmer line through Ann (Guerry) Gates Ulmer.

Adam's son Peter Ulmer (b. 1782 – d. circa 1806). He too is listed on the "Petit Jury List" for the District of Beaufort, and, as of 1780, resides in Prince William Parish, Beaufort District. He is married to Margaret Caldwell Smyly (20 May 1782 – 9 Nov 1847). This information was found in Jury Lists, 1778, #1078 @ SC Archives, pg. 11, fam. #: 307. Peter Ulmer is shown, as of 1800, as living in St. Bartholomew, Colleton District, SC. His household had seven members, including a daughter, Mary Ann, whose marriage to a John Crumpton is recorded in SC Marriages, Vol. VI, 1753. Mary Ann Ulmer married John Crumpton between 1818 and 1820.

There are several Ulmers to be found as witnesses in the various wills of South Carolinians from the years 1760 to 1784. Abstracts of the Wills of the State of SC 1760 - 1784, edited by Caroline T. Moore, c. 1969, lists four Ulmers: Ann, Jacob, John, and Philip. Ann is mentioned in the will of Susannah Winborn. Winborn, a widow from St. John's Parish, Colleton County has a daughter named Mary Fickling. Ann is named as a grandchild. George Fickling is listed as a witness of the Winborn will. This would connect Ann Ulmer to the Fickling family of Hilton Head Island (page 309, Abstracts of the Wills of SC) The Fickling family owned Possum Point Plantation, now Wexford Plantation. Jacob Ulmer appears as a witness in the will of planter James Lennox of St. James Parish, Goose Creek, Berkley Co. Lennox's daughter is Catherine Judith Moultrie (page 323). The 1774 will of Daniel Shuler includes John Ulmer as executor; as well as his wife Barbara and an Adam Snell. Surely these are the same Shulers we know to be related through the marriage of Mary Barbara Shuler and John Frederick Ulmer in 1752 (page 214). The location of William MacCormack's SC plantation is not listed, but Philip Ulmar (Ulmer) is a witness to his will prior to MacCormack's 1777 death (page 270).

The origins of Ulmer, SC appear to stem from land belonging to two men, Ephraim Ulmer and John Williams. The Williams family who is listed among the plantation household in the 1860 Census may certainly be descendants of John Williams. However, Williams is a common name, and the 1790 Census lists twenty John Williams's throughout the state of SC. In any case, the land dates back to the 1700's, pre-Revolutionary War, and were located on the banks of the Salkehatchie River, near Buford's Bridge. The Great Salkehatchie Baptist Church at Ulmer, SC was organized in 1790. The first pastors were Rev. Holcolme and Rev. James Sweat. The church was destroyed by Sherman's army, re-built, and in 1915 was moved to a new site in the town of Ulmer. There is an "Ulmerville" near the town of Cameron, SC on the Orangeburg County line so named because of the concentration of families with the Ulmer name in Cameron. In 1974, the National Register of Historic Places lists the Ulmers-Summers House, Calhoun, SC (from Names In South Carolina, various volumes, Claude H. Neuffer).

There is an Ephraim Ulmer born in 1810 in SC, with a wife, Eliza, born 1815. The 1860 Census finds him in Barnwell Co., at 50 years of age, a planter holding large amounts of real estate valued at \$28,500., and personal estate valued at \$17,600. Their children are:
Henry Ulmer, born c. 1843
Rebecca Ulmer, born c. 1844
James Ulmer, born c. 1846
Sam Ulmer, born c. 1854
And S. Jane Ulmer, b. 20 March 1861, d. 19 December 1925, in Cross, SC.

Their plantation "household" includes several other family surnames, such as Kinsey, Johnson, George, Briant, and Williams.

Ephraim and Eliza appear to have planted Buckingham Plantation, which was located near the bridge which now connects Bluffton and Hilton Head Island.

Conflicting information has it that an Ephraim Mikell Baynard, born in 1830, married Elizabeth Van Pelt (according to SC Hist. Magazine, vol. 66, p. 59). Their daughter Eliza married (eloped!) with an Ulmer and as a result, the Ulmer family came to own and plant the Buckingham Plantation. Was their son Ephraim Ulmer? If so, he could not have been born in 1810, or Eliza in 1815. Eliza VanPelt was the daughter of Peter Van Pelt, a northerner who travelled to South Carolina as Rector of a Port Royal church (St. Luke's in Bluffton?) in 1824. If Peter Van Pelt was an adult in 1824, it would make sense that Eliza would be born circa 1830, like Ephraim M. Baynard. He was the son of William Eddings Baynard (and Catherine Scott) of Braddock's Point (he won it!) and created Zion Cemetery. His son Ephraim Mikell was named Mikell after a bachelor uncle who gave away 17 plantations to his various nieces and nephews. Young couples eloping (possibly against their parents' wishes?) and winning plantations in card games, 19th Century Hilton Head certainly had its excitement.

The 1860 U. S. Federal Slave Schedules, Prince William's Parish, Beaufort District, SC show slave owner Ephraim Ulmer in possession of two male slaves; twenty one year old John Brown Ulmer "employer" of one 16 year old slave (E. Smiley, owner); while Thomas M. Ulmer, age twenty five, owns two female slaves, and Rebecca Ulmer three slaves. This Rebecca Ulmer, according to the 1860 Census, was born in 1803, aged 57 years as of 1860, living with 2 daughters on land valued at \$500. In Prince William Parish, Beaufort, SC.

There are thirteen known graves belonging to members of the Ulmer family in the Bluffton Cemetery. The oldest being that of Charles Ephraim Ulmer, born 1866 and died 1954. In Gillisonville Cemetery, Jasper County, SC fifteen Ulmers are buried – the oldest grave being that of Henry D. Ulmer, born Dec. 1821 and died Nov. 1896. Ridgeland Cemetery, Jasper Co., contains the remains of three Ulmers. Sarah Helen Ulmer Horton, born April 24, 1880, died December 18, 1968 was the oldest Ulmer grave found there. There are forty Ulmer graves to be found in Ruffin and Walterboro, Colleton County, SC, four of which are unnamed infants. Carolina Memorial Park in North Charleston, SC had five, with Jessie W. Ulmer, born 1915, died 1993, being the eldest. Thirty nine Ulmer family gravesites are recorded in several cemeteries throughout Orangeburg County SC. The oldest here is Abison A. Ulmer, (Dec. 2 1837 – Nov. 11, 1862) found in Bull Swamp Cemetery. Perhaps he was a Civil War casualty? Barnwell County holds the graves of five Ulmer family members – James M. Ulmer, born Oct. 18, 1845, died Jan. 3, 1921, being the oldest one. Ima Hogg Ulmer (1892-1929) should be recognized for having the most unfortunate name in Barnwell County. Numerous cemeteries in Hampton Co., SC have Ulmer graves totaling eighteen. Rebecca McTeer Ulmer has the distinction of being the eldest Ulmer in Ebenezer Cemetery. She was born July 12, 1805 and died August 15, 1873. Christopher Columbus Ulmer (1858-1921), buried in Sand Hill Cemetery, Varnville, Hampton Co., SC has a memorable name also. The information on the Ulmers found in the cemeteries of all of these counties in South Carolina came from Find A Grave.com.

The Heritage Library has in its possession a Family History titled simply Ulmer. The family crest is pictured, and it was compiled by Daniel Ulmer of Bay Springs, Mississippi, who is a great great great grandson of Adam Ulmer. His lineage also runs through David and Jacob Ulmer, as well as Addie Ulmer Holifield. Daniel Ulmer describes the coat of arms, and explains the meaning of the name Ulmer as "beside the water or pool". Von Ulmer was the first spelling of the name. He refers to several Ulmer ancestors, such as David Ulmer, born in SC in 1803 and died between 1870 and 1880, buried in "Old Ulmer Cemetery" which may be located in Jasper County. (would that be SC or Mississippi?)

Also among the family histories is a collection of love letters between Charles Ephraim Ulmer (1884-1980, buried in Bluffton Cemetery) and Hannah Elizabeth Phillips (1893-1955, buried in Bluffton Cemetery). Charles was the eldest son of Charles Ephraim Ulmer, Sr. and Elizabeth Drayson Baynard. They married in 1920. The letters provide a look at everyday life in Bluffton in the early years of the twentieth century. The book was compiled by their daughter, Rose Ulmer Shivar. (Letters From Hanna).

Adam's son Peter Ulmer (b. 1782 – d. circa 1806). He too is listed on the "Petit Jury List" for the District of Beaufort, and, as of 1780, resides in Prince William Parish, Beaufort District. He is married to Margaret Caldwell Smyly (20 May 1782 – 9 Nov 1847). This information was found in Jury Lists, 1778, #1078 @ SC Archives, pg. 11, fam. #: 307. Peter Ulmer is shown, as of 1800, as living in St. Bartholomew, Colleton District, SC. His household had seven members, including a daughter, Mary Ann, whose marriage to a John Crumpton is recorded in SC Marriages, Vol. VI, 1753. Mary Ann Ulmer married John Crumpton between 1818 and 1820.

There are several Ulmers to be found as witnesses in the various wills of South Carolinians from the years 1760 to 1784. Abstracts of the Wills of the State of SC 1760 - 1784, edited by Caroline T. Moore, c. 1969, lists four Ulmers: Ann, Jacob, John, and Philip. Ann is mentioned in the will of Susannah Winborn. Winborn, a widow from St. John's Parish, Colleton County has a daughter named Mary Fickling. Ann is named as a grandchild. George Fickling is listed as a witness of the Winborn will. This would connect Ann Ulmer to the Fickling family of Hilton Head Island (page 309, Abstracts of the Wills of SC) The Fickling family owned Possum Point Plantation, now Wexford Plantation. Jacob Ulmer appears as a witness in the will of planter James Lennox of St. James Parish, Goose Creek, Berkley Co. Lennox's daughter is Catherine Judith Moultrie (page 323). The 1774 will of Daniel Shuler includes John Ulmer as executor; as well as his wife Barbara and an Adam Snell. Surely these are the same Shulers we know to be related through the marriage of Mary Barbara Shuler and John Frederick Ulmer in 1752 (page 214). The location of William MacCormack's SC plantation is not listed, but Philip Ulmar (Ulmer) is a witness to his will prior to MacCormack's 1777 death (page 270).

certainly had its excitement. Coincidentally, I saw a copy of a Civil War pension survivor application just sitting at the front desk as I was writing this. The applicant was Teena Baynard (Brown), widow of a Confederate soldier, both former slaves whose old master was William Baynard, Sr. of Braddock's Point.

The 1860 U. S. Federal Slave Schedules, Prince William's Parish, Beaufort District, SC show slave owner Ephraim Ulmer in possession of two male slaves; twenty one year old John Brown Ulmer "employer" of one 16 year old slave (E. Smiley, owner); while Thomas M. Ulmer, age twenty five, owns two female slaves, and Rebecca Ulmer three slaves. This Rebecca Ulmer, according to the 1860 Census, was born in 1803, aged 57 years as of 1860, living with 2 daughters on land valued at \$500. In Prince William Parish, Beaufort, SC.

There are thirteen known graves belonging to members of the Ulmer family in the Bluffton Cemetery. The oldest being that of Charles Ephraim Ulmer, born 1866 and died 1954. In Gillisonville Cemetery, Jasper County, SC fifteen Ulmers are buried – the oldest grave being that of Henry D. Ulmer, born Dec. 1821 and died Nov. 1896. Ridgeland Cemetery, Jasper Co., contains the remains of three Ulmers. Sarah Helen Ulmer Horton, born April 24, 1880, died December 18, 1968 was the oldest Ulmer grave found there. There are forty Ulmer graves to be found in Ruffin and Walterboro, Colleton County, SC, four of which are unnamed infants. Carolina Memorial Park in North Charleston, SC had five, with Jessie W. Ulmer, born 1915, died 1993, being the eldest. Thirty nine Ulmer family gravesites are recorded in several cemeteries throughout Orangeburg County SC. The oldest here is Abison A. Ulmer, (Dec. 2 1837 – Nov. 11, 1862) found in Bull Swamp Cemetery. Perhaps he was a Civil War casualty? Barnwell County holds the graves of five Ulmer family members – James M. Ulmer, born Oct. 18, 1845, died Jan. 3, 1921, being the oldest one. Ima Hogg Ulmer (1892-1929) should be recognized for having the most unfortunate name in Barnwell County. Numerous cemeteries in Hampton Co., SC have Ulmer graves totaling eighteen. Rebecca McTeer Ulmer has the distinction of being the eldest Ulmer in Ebenezer Cemetery. She was born July 12, 1805 and died August 15, 1873. Christopher Columbus Ulmer (1858-1921), buried in Sand Hill Cemetery, Varnville, Hampton Co., SC has a memorable name also. The information on the Ulmers found in the cemeteries of all of these counties in South Carolina came from Find A Grave.com.

The Heritage Library has in its possession a Family History titled simply Ulmer. The family crest is pictured, and it was compiled by Daniel Ulmer of Bay Springs, Mississippi, who is a great great great grandson of Adam Ulmer. His lineage also runs through David and Jacob Ulmer, as well as Addie Ulmer Holifield. Daniel Ulmer describes the coat of arms, and explains the meaning of the name Ulmer as "beside the water or pool". Von Ulmer was the first spelling of the name. He refers to several Ulmer ancestors, such as David Ulmer, born in SC in 1803 and died between 1870 and 1880, buried in "Old Ulmer Cemetery" which may be located in Jasper County. (would that be SC or Mississippi?)

He settled in Alabama and was a surgeon. He graduated from the Medical College of South Carolina, Charleston, S. C., in 1837. The library at the Medical College of South Carolina has a thesis on "Congestive Fever" by E. G. Ulmer, whose place of residence is listed as Chaba, Alabama. Dr. Enoch G. Ulmer married Mary Curtis who was born in Bessemer, Alabama. They had one child:

- i. Eliza Ulmer who married a Mr. Gardner who was a New York stock broker. She had no children of her own, but adopted a girl named Maude. Eliza Ulmer,

was a concert pianist who died in California and wrote her own obituary.

The basis for information on this lineage was obtained from Ulmer Family Bibles and Ulmer Family Records. The information and dates were cross checked through cemetery stones and federal census records of Colleton County, South Carolina.

VILLEPONTOUX FAMILY LINEAGE

PIERRE VILLEPONTOUX, born in the year 1643 at Bergerac, Guyenne, France, was the progenitor of this well known South Carolina family. Pierre (or Peter in English) Villepontoux, a Huguenot, was a lawyer by profession who first migrated to London, England, from France and then from London to New Rochelle, New York. In 1701 he sold his property in New York and moved to Charles Town, South Carolina.

Zachariah Villepontoux I, the son of Pierre Villepontoux, settled in St. James, Goose Creek Parish, S. C. He was a brick-maker and builder. His residence was Mt. Parnassus Plantation on the Back River branch of the Cooper River where the bricks were made and furnished by him for St. Michael's Church (completed in 1761) in Charleston. The plantation house and graveyard of Mt. Parnassus have long been destroyed although old "Pontoux", the plantation ghost, may still inhabit the house site. An account of this plantation is given in *A Day On Cooper River*, recently reprinted with notes by Samuel Gaillard Stoney. Zachariah Villepontoux I also built, and probably designed, Pompion Hill Chapel (erected 1765) in St. Thomas' Parish, near Huger, S. C., on the east branch of the Cooper River. The initials of Zachariah Villepontoux I can still be seen incised in the bricks on the sides of both doors of Pompion Hill Chapel.

The descendants of Pierre Villepontoux presently spell their name Villeponteaux.

PIERRE VILLEPONTOUX was born in the year 1643 in Bergerac, Guyenne, France. He died before the year 1711. Pierre Villepontoux married Jeanne Revaissou, who was born in the year 1658. They had the following issue:

- i. Marie Villepontoux, born in the year 1683, and died April 2, 1771. She married on October 29, 1710, to Gideon Faucheraud.

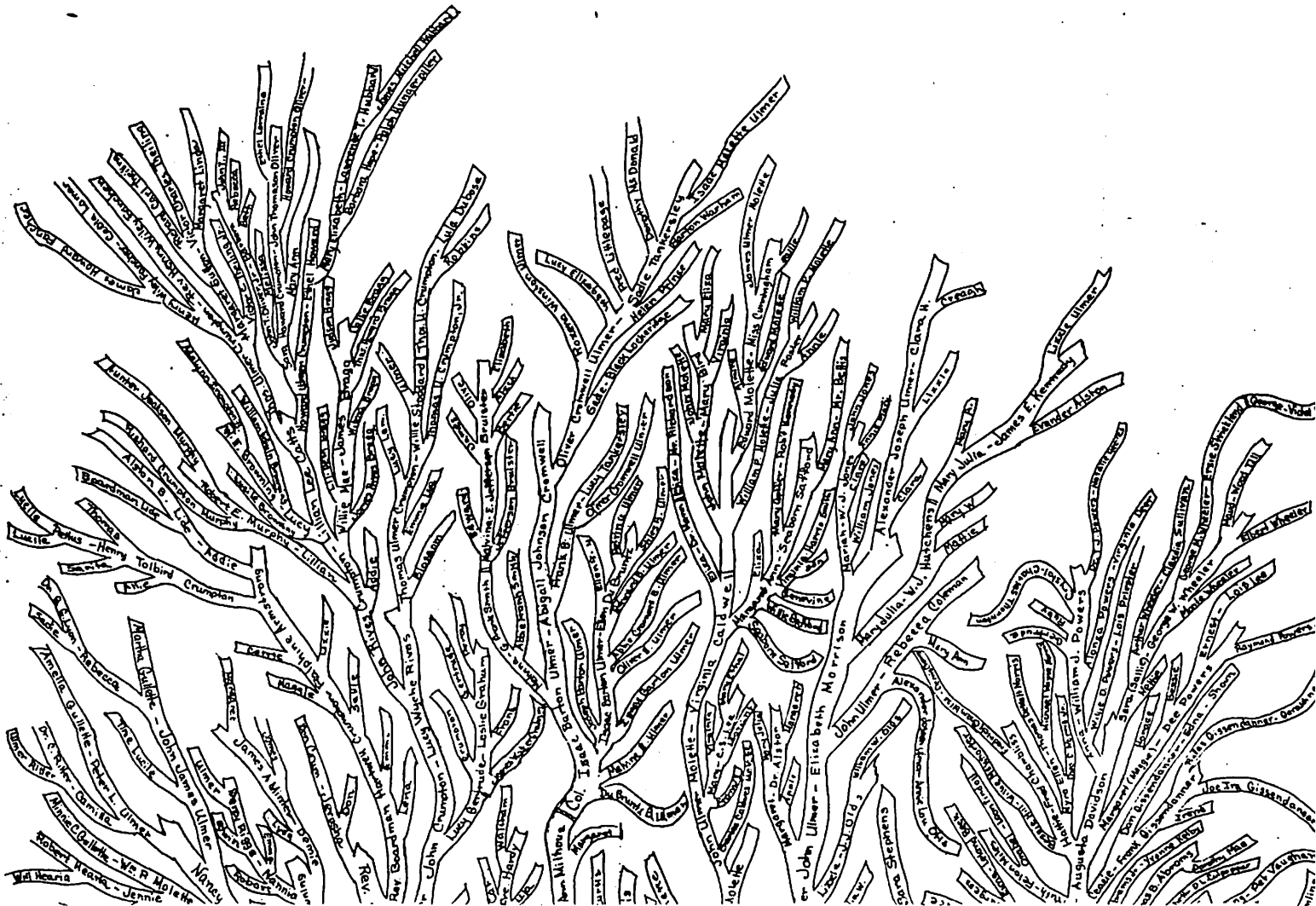

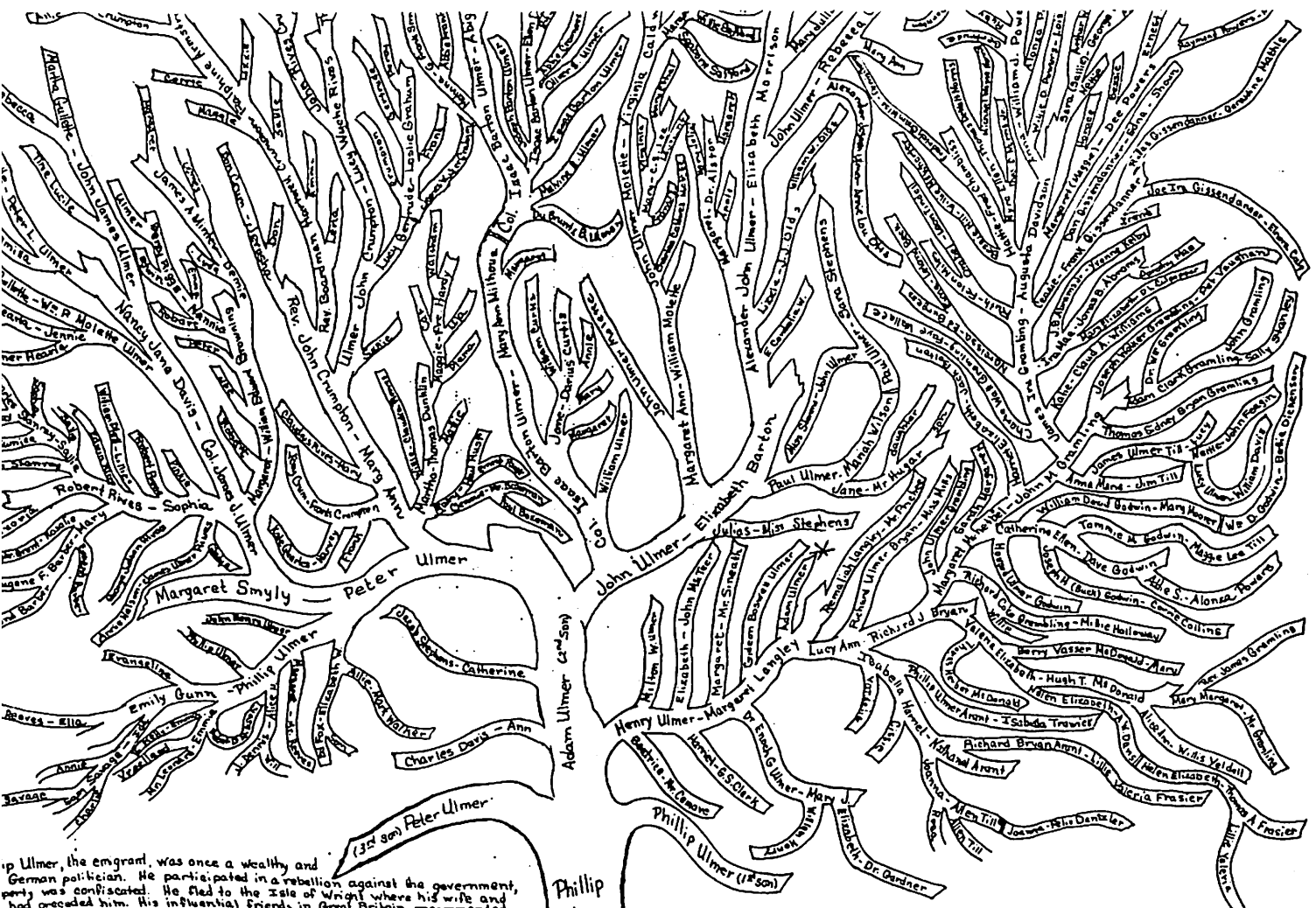

Phillip Ulmer, the emigrant, was once a wealthy and German politician. He participated in a rebellion against the government, and his property was confiscated. He fled to the Isle of Wight where his wife and two children had preceded him. His influential friends in Great Britain recommended him to the Earl of Sandwich, who was then Governor of S. C. wither he sailed under the protection of the Earl. At the Treaty of Ghent his property was restored to him, and he returned to Germany. His eldest son, Henry, was educated with the view of his being sent to Germany to claim the property, but he did not go and it is supposed the property was escheated back to the government or claimed by relatives who were in Germany. Phillip Ulmer and his wife both died of small pox and three sons were left in South Carolina. The descendants of Phillip, Dr. Adam Ulmer (17th son) and Peter (18th son) are in Mississippi and Georgia. Those of the 2nd son, are in Alabama and South Carolina.

This information is taken from the family history in the possession of Barton Ulmer, Marengo County, Alabama, by Mrs. Martha Gullett of Mobile, Alabama in 1894.

James Elliot Davis (also a Schoolmaster).
