ill health and was Rector of Sturminster Marshall, Dorset. Frances' husband died in 1749 and in or about 1751 she became Dame of the Boys' House at Eton called Jourdelays. She died in 1779.

Francis Yonge (Born c1682, probably London)

Lived at Caynton Manor, Salop, and was highly educated, doubtless at Westminster. Around 1700 he became connected with the Department of Ordnance and around 1704 was sent to Lisbon. During the War of the Spanish Succession, known in America as Queen Anne's War, and which lasted from 1701 to 1713, he was appointed Commissary of the Lisbon Ordnance Office. Among his duties was purchasing materials for the works at Gibraltar.

This job terminating, he returned to London and continued for a while with the Department there but resigned to enter service of the Lords Proprietors in South Carolina and the Bahamas. Exactly when he went to Charleston is not certain but it was some time before 1716, in which year he was made Surveyor General of South Carolina and the Bahamas. On August 8, 1717, he received a grant of a town lot in Beaufort, S. C., and by 1718 he had become a member of the Council of the Lords Proprietors of South Carolina.

In May of 1719 he was the emissary from South Carolina to the Lords Proprietors in England to present a statement of the Colonists' grievances and lay before the Body the "Protest of the Colonists against the continued administration of the Lords Proprietors." Mention of this was made in minutes of a meeting of His Majesty's Council for South Carolina, held May 21, 1721, when he and other office holders were ordered to submit their Commissions of Public Office to the new "Crown" Governor and his administration to be either confirmed or canceled.

He was a member of the King's Council from 1721 to 1733, during which period he was made Chief Justice of South Carolina. From 1720 to 1733 Francis Yonge was Agent in Great Britain of the Province of South Carolina and, in 1728, was co-author of a history of the first settlement of the Carolinas. In 1735, or soon thereafter, he left America for England and spent his last years at Westminster. In 1743 he granted to his son, Henry, all his lands in South Carolina, including Orange Island, later named Yonges Island.

Elizabeth, (Widow Fletcher) (Born c1685)

The first wife of Francis Yonge is believed to have been the young widow of George Fletcher, Esq., who had lived in, and been governor of, Barbados. She died in South Carolina and was buried December 7, 1721, in St. Andrews Churchyard, Charles Town, S. C.

Lydia Bredon (Born c1690)

Was daughter of Zaccheus Bredon, son of Sir Robert Bredon of St. Martins in the Fields, at one time Sheriff of London. She died in 1761.

Philip Yonge (Born c1683)

Was a lieutenant serving aboard H.M.S. Shrewsbury.

Anne Yonge (Born 1686)Mackworth Yonge (Baptized 4-6-1686)

Were half first cousins since Philip Yonge (baptized June 1, 1620) was grandfather of both Ann and Mackworth. Ann Archer, Philip's first wife, was Anne Yonge's grandmother and Margaret Mackworth, his second wife, was Mackworth Yonge's grandmother. Anne's father, William Yonge, and Mackworth's father, Mackworth Yonge, were half brothers.

The testator then specified that the validity of Lydia Yonge's deed be determined by the Chancellor of Georgia.

In consideration of the fact that all of the family, except Elizabeth (Bellinger) Yonge and the small children who remained with her, had been banished from Georgia for their attachment and loyalty to the British Government, the Legislature passed an ordinance after Henry's demise, which vested the whole estate in the widow and the children with her. Thereby, the four other children were deprived of their shares which had been willed to them.

Elizabeth Bellinger (Born c1712)

Was daughter of William Bellinger of Charleston and Williston, S. C., who was the second son of Edmund Bellinger, Sr., the 1st Landgrave (died 1699). William Bellinger was Surveyor General in 1698 and was younger brother of Edmund, Jr., the 2nd Landgrave, whose lands William inherited. King Charles II granted the title "Landgrave" to certain men who had helped restore him to his throne. They were given 48,000-acre blocks of land in the Carolinas and created Lords Proprietors. Edmund Bellinger, Sr., became a Landgrave in 1701. Elizabeth died March 23, 1767, at Charleston. *patent 1 Oct. 1700*

Christiana Bulloch (Born c1717, Old Granville County, S. C.)

Was daughter of James Bulloch and sister of Archibald Bulloch who was elected president of both the First and Second Provincial Congresses of Georgia. He was then elected delegate from Georgia to the Second Continental Congress and, in September, 1775, took his place in Philadelphia. On April 15, 1776, the Third Provincial Congress adopted the first fundamental document ever made by Georgians in the nature (even though temporary) of a constitution. It provided that there should be a president and commander-in-chief and Archibald Bulloch was elected to the office. He filled it until his death in the early part of 1777.

It was because Christiana was Archibald's sister that when ^{A. T. Y. R. Y.} Henry Yonge died at St. Augustine in May, 1778, she was allowed to keep "Cedar Grove", his plantation on Skidoway Island. After her husband died the Legislature passed an ordinance vesting the entire estate in her and in daughters, Elizabeth Sarah and Anne Agnes who had been left in her care. Accepting that action as legal, she would not relinquish any part of the estate to any of the four children by the first wife although her late husband's will had provided that she should have Cedar Grove and that the remainder of the estate would be divided among all the children, share and share alike.

Jane Yonge (Born 7-16-1720, Charleston, S. C.)

Was baptized June 18, 1720, in St. Andrew's Church.

Margaret Yonge (Baptized 9-18-1729)

Was baptized in St. Andrew's Church.

Charles Yonge (Born 1732, Charleston, S. C.)

Was baptized October 6, 1732, in St. Andrew's Church and was educated at Westminster in England.

NOTE 2547

Francis Yonge (Born 1730)

Lived at Toogoodoo Plantation and was a member of St. Paul's Parish, near Charleston.

Sarah Clifford (Born c1732)

Was daughter of Thomas Clifford and Mary Moore whose father was James Moore, Governor of South Carolina. Sarah lived in St. Bartholomew's and St. Paul's Parishes, S. C.

Robert Yonge (Baptized 5-30-1699)

Probably was named for his grandfather, Robert Hopton. He emigrated to South Carolina and, being recommended by His Majesty's Council to Governor Francis Nicholson for the office of Register of Deeds of South Carolina, he was so commissioned on June 1, 1721.

His marriage to Hannah, Widow Eve, was in St. Andrews Episcopal Church, near Charleston. Since she was heir to Toogoodoo Plantation, Robert Yonge thereby acquired the status of Landholder and Planter, and with it a degree of affluence and social acceptance in the Colony. He was commissioned Justice of the Peace for Berkeley County on June 7, 1734, and the commission was renewed April 2, 1737. He was appointed Associated Judge of S. C. in 1740.

After Hannah's death he married Elizabeth Elliott Butler, widow of a Mr. D'Arques. Robert was buried at Toogoodoo Plantation in Colleton County.

Hannah, Widow Eve (Born c1700)

Was widow of Abraham Eve of St. Paul's Parish, Colleton County, S. C. His will, dated March 22, 1723, was proved May 10, 1723.

Henry Yonge (Baptized 1-25-1702)

Was ordained chaplain of the 47th Regiment (Col. Lascelles) on March 5, 1751.

NOTE 2545

William Yonge (Baptized 3-9-1708)

Was the last Yonge owner of Caynton (Kenton) Manor. The modern way (Caynton) of spelling the name of the Manor is a corruption evolved from a period of uncertain spelling of the original Kenton, which was probably the correct sound of the word as originally pronounced. In 1749 William Yonge broke the entail and sold to William Briscoe what was left of the family seat, consisting of 500 acres of land in Caynton, Calvington, Tibberton, Howle, Chetwynd and Edgmund, and which had been in the family 417 years. After he sold Caynton Manor William Yonge retired to Great Torrington, in Devonshire, where his brother, Henry, was vicar. He died there and is buried at Great Torrington Church.

The Reverend Henry Yonge (Baptized 12-6-1713)

Was admitted to Westminster School in 1723 at the age of ten, to Kings College in 1728, and to the Inner Temple March 5, 1732. He was elected to Christ Church, Oxford, matriculated May 25, 1733, and received his B. A. in 1737 and his M. A. from Christ College, Cambridge, in 1739/40.

He was appointed by Christ Church to the vicarage of Great Torrington, Devon, in 1746. There, he served 38 years until his death at age 71. He married at Burwarton, Salop, a daughter of John Wolley of Ludlow, Salop, Bailiff of Ludlow in 1723. John Wolley's wife was Sarah, daughter of John Pearce of Ludlow. Sarah (Wolley) Yonge was born in 1715 and died November 25, 1759.

Catherine Yonge (Born c1745)

Frances Yonge (Born c1747)

Jointly succeeded their mother as Dame of Jourdelays (en relatione the Provost of Eton).

NOTE 2546

The Rt. Rev. Philip Yonge, Lord Bishop of Bristol - later of Norwich (Born 1709, Lisbon)

Was born while his father was in Lisbon serving his country. He was admitted to St. Peter's College, Westminster, in September, 1718, at the age of nine and was King's Scholar in 1725. He was elected to Trinity College, University of Cambridge, 7-1-1728, admitted pensioner the same year, scholar in 1729, B. A. 1732, minor fellow in 1734, major fellow in 1735 and D. D. per literas regis in 1750. Meanwhile, he was Tutor of the College, 1738 to 1750, Junior Bursar, 1746-1748, Junior Dean, 1748-49, and he became Public Orator of
